The bark Prussia, cleared yesterday for San Francisco with a lumber cargo. She takes 32,112 feet, and is expected to get to sea today.

Circuit court has been adjourned by Judge McCall until the second Monday in December, when the civil cases then on the docket will be heard.

Archbishop Christie, of the diocese of Oregon, will be in the city tomorrow. He will deliver the morning and evening sermons at St. Mary's Catholic church.

Twenty-eight nickel-in-the-slot machine licenses have been issued during the present quarter. About a dozen others will be issued within the next few days.

James M. Anderson, the five-year-old son of M. K. Anderson, a resident of East Astoria, died Thursday evening of spinal meningitis. The funeral will occur today.

Carl Wiggen lost the first finger of the right hand yesterday while at work in the Clatsop mill box factory. The accident occurred while Wiggen was working at a planer.

All the usual services will be observed at the Baptist church tomorrow. The subjects of the sermons will be "Perseverance and Success," and "Characteristics of the Saved."

Two vessels were reported in the offing yesterday afternoon, but reports from the heads were rather conflicting. It is believed one is a ship and the other a barkentine. They are expected in today.

Registrations have been very slow during the past week, and the daily average has not been more than five. In all, perhaps less than 250 voters have registered, out of a total of about 1500. Indications are that the candidates for the city offices will have a snap so far as campaign expenses are concerned.

Encouraging reports were received at the fish warden's office yesterday from the Swan Falls, Idaho, hatchery site. Rafts have been installed there and fish will be received within a short time. The river is said to be full of salmon, and the expectations of Mr. Van Dusen will unquestionably be fulfilled. This hatchery will be one of the first in the Northwest, it is thought.

The sawmill committee yesterday put in another busy day, and interviewed a number of property owners. While no additional subscriptions were received, those called upon, with one exception, were anxious to lend financial assistance, but asked time to consider the matter. After the committee closed its work for the day individual members were approached by several Astorians and assured that the enterprise would be backed by them. There is no question that the amount will be raised within a short time, as the people seem to be thoroughly imbued with the sawmill sentiment.

Inspectors Edwards and Fuller have condemned Escort No. 2, the bar tug, and after November 1 the vessel will not be permitted to go to sea. Escort was built in 1882 at Coos bay and has been in the service ever since. In 1892 she was rebuilt, but now her hull is old and she is considered unseaworthy. The present boiler was built in 1887 and of late the steamer has been permitted to carry not more than 95 pounds of steam. Her original cost was about \$20,000. Doubtless she will be taken to the Portland boneyard and there torn to pieces, though under the condemnation she may be employed in the river service. The tug will be succeeded by the Tatonah.

The big carrier Glendalough is on her deep water is problematical. However, she is working the tide, the date of her arrival at deep water is problematical. However, she is expected today. The Glendalough will take from the Columbia 22,500 barrels of wheat. Of this amount a fair-sized cargo will be lightered down the river and loaded at Astoria. The amount to be lightered will probably be about 1500 tons. Great expense is attached to this work of lightering as the grain must be handled twice, to say nothing of the cost of delay, but the public-spirited people of Portland are understood to have defrayed the expense.

Contractor Houston has increased the force of men at work on the improvement to the government building, and much better progress is now being made. Mr. Houston is rushing matters, as he is anxious to take advantage of the present fine weather to lay the concrete sidewalks. Collector of Customs Fox will recommend to the treasury department that an appropriation be made for the purpose of filling the lot and resodding it. The lot is a few feet below the level of the street and its appearance would be greatly improved upon by filling. Doubtless the recommendation will be favorably considered. When the lot is brought up to the level of the street, the office square will be one of the prettiest spots in the city. The shade trees have grown to be quite large and add very much to the appearance of the square.

FINISHED THEIR WORK

WHITE RIBBONERS' CONVENTION HAS ADJOURNED.

Resolutions Adopted Last Evening Touch Upon Many Very Important Subjects.

The nineteenth annual convention of the Oregon W. C. T. U. came to an end last evening, after a most successful session. The evening was devoted to the work of superintendents, demonstrations being given. The musical numbers were excellent and a large number of people were present.

Yesterday a set of resolutions, sweeping in its character, was adopted. The resolutions contain reference to the assassination of President McKinley, and fix upon saloons responsibility for the crime. The anti-cigarette movement recently undertaken is touched upon, and organization of leagues to work in connection with school boards is urged. Many other matters of importance are referred to in the resolutions, which follow:

"Preamble: We rejoice that God has led us so graciously during the past year, and, believing in His power to guide, we place our trust implicitly in Him and follow where He leads. We will continue our allegiance to the declaration of the principles given us by Mother National, and will try in the coming year to make our department work a valuable adjunct to our educational influence.

"Whereas, We rejoice in the great volume of testimony which is coming to us from the laboratories of the old world and from the medical journals and physicians of our own country in support of the principles of total abstinence; and

"Whereas, We deem it of great importance that every member of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union be familiar with these truths and be a medium for communicating them to the teachers in the public schools and to the public generally;

"Resolved, That we urge all unions in our state to devote at least three meetings to the study of the questions: 'What shall be taught in the study of temperance physiology?' 'To what extent should it be taught?' 'By what methods should it be taught?' The programs and necessary material for such meetings may be obtained of the national superintendent of scientific temperance instruction.

"Since the first of the twentieth century has witnessed the establishment of a court of nations for the settlement of international differences;

"Resolved, That we will labor to create sentiment in favor of referring all controversies to this arbitration of reason instead of resorting to the sword;

"Resolved, That we will continue, as in the past, to aid the Florence Crittenton refuge home, and to strengthen the hands of Mrs. Anna R. Riggs, who has so long led that work; that we rejoice in the great victory that came to the temperance cause by the passing of the anti-liquor law at the opening of congress, December, 1900; and that we are assured the effort to repeal this law will be in evidence when congress again convenes. We urge white ribboners and temperance people everywhere to do their best by pen and in voice to strengthen the position taken by our senators and representatives at the time of the passage of this act, thus preventing any backward step.

"Resolved, That we urge as special work in the unions the presentation of the matter of organizing anti-cigarette leagues before the school boards, and that these leagues be organized wherever it is possible to do so;

"Resolved, That we, in common with former state president, Mrs. N. W. Kinney, our state has suffered an irreparable loss, yet in this common sorrow we would bow in submission to the will of the Father, who has called her higher, and we will seek to emulate her example of consecration to the cause she espoused in early life and to which she stood true until death, and would extend our sincere sympathy to the bereaved family.

"Resolved, That we, in common with all our citizens, are shocked at the taking of the life of the president of our nation. We urge our lawmakers to enact laws that will crush out anarchistic sentiments from our country, and thus prevent a repetition of such a horrible murder. We also urge that measures be advanced that will aid in removing the primary cause—the legalized liquor traffic. We believe it was in the saloon the assassin learned the lessons that made him what he was.

"Resolved, That we sympathize with Mrs. McKinley in the loss of her loving husband, and pray our Father to uphold her with His everlasting arms.

"Resolved, That the thanks of this convention are due, and are heartily given, to the ladies of the union of Astoria, who have tendered us every courtesy and attention, which has made us feel so much at home in their midst; to the ladies of the various churches, who have ministered to our material needs by furnishing such bountiful lunches at the noon hour; to the officers and members of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches, who have kindly opened their doors for us; to Miss Busey, who had charge of the music, which added so much to the entertainment of the evening; to the Southern Pacific railroad, which gave reduced rates to the delegates; to the
