

ARRAIGNED ON TWO INDICTMENTS

Special Labor Organizer Arrested
at Hornellville.

INCITED WORKERS TO STRIKE

One Indictment Charges Him With Being
a Public Nuisance—Lawless Acts by
Union and Non-Union Men
in Florida.

JAMESTOWN, N. Y., Oct. 15.—Gov. M. Gunter, a special organizer of the Woodworkers Union from Boston, arrested in Hornellville and brought to Jamestown, was finally taken to Mayville, where he has been arraigned on two indictments.

One charges him with being a public nuisance, being based upon attempts of Organizer Gunter to bring on a strike of the woodworkers in Jamestown during the latter part of the summer. The other indictment accuses him of uttering false rumors about a strike with the object of depreciating the value of bonds and stocks of the Jamestown manufacturing and mining business.

When arraigned, Gunter pleaded not guilty and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$500. It is expected that there will be a speedy trial which promises to be one of the most interesting and important ever heard in Chautauque county.

THE FLORIDA LABOR TROUBLE

Rather Unsatisfactory Report Made by
United States District Attorney.

TAMPA, Fla., Oct. 15.—United States District Attorney J. N. Stripping, who has been here several days investigating the labor troubles, and especially the recent deportation of Resistencia strike leaders, and with a view of adjusting differences, has made his report to the attorney general at Washington. He describes in detail the trouble between the striking cigar makers and the manufacturers and declares "the gravity of the situation can scarcely be overstated." He found that lawless acts had been committed by both union men and their opponents, but he was unable to obtain any evidence to identify the individuals who committed these acts of lawlessness.

"I conferred freely with members of the board of trade, with representative citizens and with the executive committee of the Resistencia union, which is conducting the strike, but was unable to obtain evidence of violation of the laws of the United States."

The district attorney then deals with the differences between the employers and the men. He has been striving to obtain concessions on each side that will lead to an adjustment and is hopeful of success.

BRINGING BACK WHEAT.

Vessels Return to Boston With Their
Grain Cargoes.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Grain shippers at this port are allowing their grain to remain on the steamers and to be brought back to this country and shipped again to its destination in the expectation of some improvement in the grain situation in the meantime, says the Boston correspondent of the Tribune.

The Furness line of steamers, which leaves London on Wednesday for this port will bring back a portion of her outward cargo of 4,000 bushels of wheat which she carried out. The same line, which sailed on October 6 for London will bring back 16,000 bushels of wheat which she carried out. The Furness steamer Appamatic, operating between Newport, News and London, is coming westward with 40,000 out of 50,000 bushels of grain shipped. This curious state of affairs is due in part to extremely low trans-Atlantic freight rates prevailing and partly to the scarcity of warehouses on the other side and the resultant high storage rates.

SCENE AT AMER'S FUNERAL

Ceremonies Attending the Successor of
the Dead Ruler.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The Simla correspondent of the Times says a report from the British political officer at the Khyber Pass shows that everything is perfectly quiet on the frontier and traders are passing through.

The scene at the funeral of the late Amer at Kabul is described as a dramatic one. The Chief Kail addressing the people at a durbar, declared that Abdul Rahman could not be buried until the new Amer had assumed power. Then he wound the turban round Habib Ullah's head, and saluted him as Amer. Habib Ullah addressed the multitude, proclaiming his intention of maintaining his father's kingdom unaltered and unimpaired, and of continuing in alliance and friendly relations with the British government.

ATHLETIC CLUBS MEET

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION'S
METHODS OPPOSED.

Dissenting Faction Assert It Is Not
Getting Proper Consideration
—Other Sporting News.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—A conference of delegates of athletic clubs opposed to the Amateur Athletic Union and its methods of conducting amateur athletics has just been held here. It is asserted by many active athletic clubs that they are not getting proper consideration. The dissenting faction asserts that there are members on the governing board of the A. A. U. selected from small clubs who take no active part in athletics.

It was decided to ask the board of managers to change a number of rules, and there was some talk of forming an opposition organization. It was said that there were plenty of clubs ready to go into a new organization and that the Pittsburgh district would furnish a dozen clubs for this purpose. It was decided to ask President Sullivan to call a meeting of the board of managers of the Metropolitan Association by November 1, so that these matters could be laid before it prior to the annual meeting, November 18.

OTHER SPORTING NEWS.

Five Crack Billiardists to Compete in a
New York Tournament.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—An international billiard match is scheduled to take place in this city in the latter part of November. The players are to be Jacob Schaefer, George Slosson, George Sutton, M. Baruch and Albert Fourneil. This information has just been given out by the brother of George Sutton, who says that the latter will arrive here soon from Chicago. Baruch and Fourneil are Frenchmen.

NEW BOWLING RECORD.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—In a contest between teams in the Chicago league last night, the world's bowling record for high averages was broken. In a series of three games played, the score was 1017, 94 and 1067. The best average was 357.1-4, made in the Illinois Bowling Association championship series by the Chicago league team last April.

TITUS AFTER CHAMPIONSHIP.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Charles S. Titus, according to the Times, will join the New York Athletic Club with the expectation that that organization will send him to England next year to try for the celebrated "diamond sculls" at Henley. Since the announced retirement of E. H. Ten Eyck, Titus has generally been considered as having succeeded to the championship in single sculls.

MONEY PACKAGE STOLEN

\$7000 CONSIGNED TO THE SUB-
TREASURY.

Secret Service Officials Believe It
Was Stolen After Reaching
Its Destination.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—W. H. Brendell, collector of customs at Buffalo, has been in this city recently in consultation with the sub-treasury officials and secret service officers over the theft of \$7000 from an express package containing \$7000, consigned from Buffalo to the sub-treasury president.

The original package was filled with \$1000 in bills of the same denomination as were in it when it left Buffalo. Certain packages had been made in the covering at Buffalo and when the package was again filled these packages, which had penetrated two portions of the covering, were found to fit exactly. The package was carefully traced and it was shown that it had not been tampered with from the time it was received for by the express company until it was delivered at the sub-treasury. It was also proved that it had been receipted for in good order at the sub-treasury and that the seals were unbroken.

After the expert examination the secret service men are inclined to think the package was tampered with after it reached the sub-treasury and had been broken.

THIS LADY HAS JEWELS.

Interesting Fact Has Been Positively
Determined by the Police.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Jewels valued at \$7000, the property of Mrs. Graeme Harrison of London, missing for five hours, have been returned to their owner.

Mrs. Harrison, who was Miss Alice Ogston, a well-known society woman of Baltimore, had spent the summer with her daughters at Newport. A few days ago she arrived at Rye Lake, Westchester, for a short visit. More recently she accepted an invitation to spend the night with friends in this city. At the conclusion of her visit a basket containing a diamond brooch and several sapphires was missing. The police were notified and the gems were found in a closet. The police refused absolutely to discuss the matter.

BANK ROBBER CAPTURED

PANTOU, Ill., Oct. 15.—It is reported here that one of the four Potomac bank robbers has been captured near Rossville after a desperate struggle, it requiring six men to overpower him. The other three bandits are still at large, but are being pursued. It was learned that President Messenger had the night previous to the robbery taken \$1000 from the bank safe and deposited it in another place in the village, which accounts for the small haul made by the burglars.

CATHOLIC PRESS INDIGNANT.

Austrian Evangelical Alliance Press Resolutions at Dresden.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—A resolution adopted by the general assembly of the Evangelical Alliance at Dresden causes indignation on the part of the Austrian Catholic press, says the Vienna correspondent of the Times. The resolution expressed grateful satisfaction at the blessed progress of the Evangelical movement in Austria.

The general assembly sent hearty greetings to the Austrian Evangelicals. The correspondent says the Evangelical movement forms an integral part of the programme of the Austrian Government. Last week the Burgo-master of Vienna declared that the movement was dangerous to the state, as it was intended to facilitate the absorption of Austria by Germany.

WILL FIGHT OVER COREA.

Japan Making Preparations For a War
With Russia.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 15.—A war between Japan and Russia over Corea is predicted by Dr. Nicholas Sinn, professor of surgery in the University of Chicago, who has arrived here from a tour of the Orient. Said he: "While I was in Japan I noticed on every hand that the Japanese were making preparations for war with Russia and they made no secret of it. The cause of the trouble is no secret in Japan. It wants Corea. Japan is not large enough for the Japanese. Russia practically holds Manchuria and Japan does not intend letting this nation extend its influence in Corea if this condition can be prevented. Hence the preparations for war."

YACHT IOWA WRECKED.

Missed Strays and Gave Ashore on
Breakwater Off Milford Point.

STATIONED, Conn., Oct. 15.—The large yacht Iowa, of New Bern, N. C., has been wrecked off the mouth of the Housatonic river and will prove a total loss. A party of ladies and gentlemen on board were taken off safely and cared for at the homes of summer residents here.

CROWNED HEADS TO MEET.

Victor Emanuel and Czar to Confer
Over Balkan Situation.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The Rome correspondent of the Times says that King Victor Emanuel will not meet the czar at St. Petersburg, but at some other city, where Emperor Francis Joseph will also be present.

It is believed that the chief object of the meeting is to examine the situation in the Balkans with a view to antagonism growing between Italy and Austria-Hungary and the anxiety of Russia to avoid complications.

The date for the meeting has not yet been determined. The king will be accompanied by the premier and foreign minister.

HAD FINGER AMPUTATED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—A dispatch from Paris to the Times says it has been found necessary to amputate one of the fingers of Dr. Calmette, director of the Pasteur Institute, on account of a bite from a cobra from which he was extracting the venom. It is presumed that the serum invented by Dr. Calmette after his studies in Cochin-China saved his life.

DESTITUTION IN CAPE TOWN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Times says there has been a renewed influx lately of poor people who hope to reach Johannesburg. These stranded in Cape Town include many Russian Jews. Efforts are being made to stop the immigration as the immigrants must be supported by public charity.

OPPOSED TO EXPENDITURE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The Paris correspondent of the Times says the judges' committee in suits of the remembrance of M. Delaunay, the minister of marine, has struck out the vote for three new iron clads, M. Delaunay, the minister of finance, announces that the government will oppose with extreme energy any proposal to increase the expenditure.

PRICE OF COFFEES RAISED.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—An advance of half a cent per pound in the price of their coffee has just been announced by the Atlantic Brothers, which makes the net price 54¢. It is said the coffee houses affiliated with the American Sugar Refining Company have made no change in the price of package coffee.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The marriage of Senator Dewey and Miss May Palmer, according to a special to the World from Washington, will take place during the week beginning November 1 in the European home of Mrs. Van Anden, sister of Mrs. Palmer.
