The Seattle mill is rushed with orders and is working night and day, according to Mr. Patton. The mill also burns a large amount monthly and is a business most substantial institution.

A force of men are at work remodeling the Kluney block on Commercial street, under the supervision of Contractor Palmberg. It is proposed to convert this building into an up-to-date modern structure.

It was reported yesterday that the lightship had gone adrift from her moorings during the prevalence of the storm, but the report was erroneous. It was also stated that the Maunahala had replaced the vessel, but the tender did not leave port.

Several of the persons involved by the United States grand jury have pleaded guilty and been sentenced, but as there are still several cases to be tried, Judge Bellinger has made an order that 30 per cent jurors be summoned to appear in court November 15.

Not more than one-half the legal voters of the city have registered for the city election. The fact that voters registered at the court house last election will not avail them at the charter election. The new law provides for separate registration.

A statement in last evening's Budget to the effect that Mr. Whipple and F. D. Batzer were interviewing the people of the city on the establishment of a local sawmill, Mr. Whipple says is an error. Mr. Batzer and himself being out on an entirely different matter.

The rummage sale is still on at the old McAllen & McDonnell store. During the past few days the stock of goods has been added to, and new purchasers may find anything he might want. There is a large assortment of goods on hand and genuine bargains are offered.

Superintendent Calbreath, of the Oregon state hospital, has notified the county officials that Lydia Christoferson, who was committed from this county April 16, was discharged October 24, for a three months' leave of absence. The woman, the superintendent writes, is very much improved.

Articles of incorporation of the Commercial Bowling Company were filed in the office of County Clerk Wheeler yesterday afternoon. The incorporators are Herman Wieg, A. Scherneckau and A. M. Smith. The capital stock is placed at \$1500, divided into 44 shares each of \$33.33. The new company will operate a bowling alley in connection with the Commercial Club.

When the city granted the railroad company a franchise to run through the city, it was agreed that the road should pay \$100 per year for the privilege. Owing to some oversight this payment has been overlooked and the attention of the company was called to the matter by City Attorney Smith. Yesterday Superintendent McGuire of the A. & C. R. called on Mr. Smith and paid the sum of \$200, that being the amount due to date.

The contract for removing the alleys to the lot adjoining the Commercial Club building has already been awarded, and within 30 days the bowlers will be soughting strikes and spares.

Park & Co. is in the city, and a competent force of men will be put in the field at once to procure such necessary data as will insure a strictly first-class directory—only having all the features contained in directories of larger cities. The directory, as its name implies, is as well as its advantages as a place of residence, as a summer resort, will be fully set forth. In fact, it will serve the purposes of a hand book on these topics, and as the directory will be placed in the library of the city, it will be a most valuable addition to the city's resources. Another feature is that directories of Portland, San Francisco, Duluth and other cities will be included. At some convenient place in the city will be established by Park & Co.

The marriage of Mr. Frank Duncan Shields and Miss Harriet Merwin Sayre will be solemnized this afternoon, at 2 o'clock, at the First Presbyterian church. Rev. Henry Merwin officiating. Miss Ames of Portland, will be maid of honor, and Mr. Shields will be attended by Mr. William M. Malburn, of San Luis, as best man. The bride will be Miss Grace Ames of Portland, and Miss Cole, Mrs. J. R. A. Bennett and Mr. H. T. Finlay will serve as ushers. A large number of cards have been sent for the ceremony, at the conclusion of which a simple reception will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Marcorie, for the bride party and immediate friends of the contracting parties. Miss Sayre, whose father, the late Rev. S. Sayre, was one of the pioneer Presbyterian ministers in this section, is one of Astoria's most charming young ladies. Mr. Shields' popularity in Astoria and throughout Oregon is unbounded. He is connected with the Portland branch of the Standard Oil Company. The newly married couple will leave tonight on an extended trip which will embrace Puget sound cities and Southern California ports. Upon their return, they will go to housekeeping in Astoria for the winter.

MERGING OF TWO CLUBS

THE MATTER AGAIN TAKEN UP LAST EVENING.

Committee Named to Call Upon the Members and Determine Sentiment.

A special meeting of the Push Club was held at the Commercial Club rooms last evening, when the matter of merging the two clubs was again taken up. At the last session of the club Harrison Allen, G. C. Fulton and John H. Smith were named a committee to report upon the manner in which consolidation could be effected, and the report was presented last evening.

The report states that merging of the two clubs interested can be brought about only through unanimous consent of the members of one, as there could be no way of forcing members to leave one organization and join the other. Assuming that it is the unanimous desire of its members to dissolve the Push Club, the committee offers the following recommendation:

That the Push Club proceed to incorporate and then secure from Harry L. Hamblin, W. L. Robb and August Hildebrand, trustees, title to the park. When title is thus transferred, the report continued, the Push Club should name another board of trustees, to whom the park should be turned over, with the authorization that the trustees relinquish title to the city upon the payment by the municipality of the amount still due Mr. Shively. Provision for keeping up payments on the park was also made.

Actual consolidation of the clubs was suggested as follows: That one organization elect to membership all persons belonging to the other club, thus permitting the last-named institution to die a natural death. Regarding disposition of the assets of the Push Club, the report concluded:

"It was suggested that members of the Progressive Association shall join the Commercial Club, and the Progressive Association be dissolved. It will then become important as to what shall be done with the money now in the treasury of the Progressive Association. This money belongs to each individual member of the Progressive Association, and was paid in for the purpose of carrying out the organization and paying the purchase price of the twelve-acre tract of land. This money cannot be turned over to the Commercial Club unless the consent of all the members of the Progressive Association is first obtained, but we are of the opinion that this money could be paid to the trustees to whom the said real estate shall be conveyed according to the plan above suggested, to be used in the payment of the purchase price of the real estate as originally intended it should be."

After the report was read, the matter was discussed at some length. It was the opinion that there should be a thorough canvass among the members before any definite steps were taken, and the following committee was named to ascertain whether or not the members of the Push Club will agree to join the Commercial Club, thereby consolidating the two organizations and dissolving the Push Club: H. S. Lyman, P. H. Sovey and R. M. Garton. This committee will call upon every member of the Push Club and on next Friday evening will make its report to the club. The meeting will be held at 7:30, at which hour all members are requested to be present.

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
