

## WILL FIGHT INJUNCTIONS

**Labor Leaders Perfect Organization of an Anti-Injunction League at Chicago.**

### A LARGE FUND TO BE RAISED

Practice of "Railroading" Strikers and Strikers Sympathizers to Jail on Injunction Proceedings Will Be Vigorously Opposed.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Labor's scheme for an organization to fight the injunctions of judges and courts against strikers has been realized by the founding of the Chicago Anti-Injunction League at a special meeting of the officials of the Chicago Federation of Labor last night.

Provision for starting a vast sinking fund to wage legal battle in court against the imprisonment of any strikers or picketers under the injunction process is a notable feature of the new body.

Alleged abuses which are to be fought with special vigor and persistency are the practices by which the attorneys of industrial combinations are declared to have "railroaded" strikers and strike sympathizers to jail on injunction proceedings. Legal fights by the best talent obtainable will be made for the liberty of each striker or picket as often as any are cited before a judge for alleged violation or "contempt" of an injunction order.

Frequent use of the writ of habeas corpus is threatened and in case that the alleged arbitrariness of the judges is not voluntarily restricted or compelled by agitation, the anti-injunction league will not hesitate to ask for the impeachment of members of the judiciary on charges of oppression of the citizen and malfeasance in office.

## FINANCES ARE SHORT

**REGATTA COMMITTEE NEARLY \$150 TO THE BAD.**

**Expenditures for Eighth Carnival Exceeded \$7,000—Statement of Chairman Parker.**

At last night's meeting of the Push Club, Chairman F. L. Parker, of the regatta committee, presented his final report. The statement shows a deficit of \$144.11. The total receipts were \$6875.22, while the expenditures aggregated \$7019.33.

From Chairman Parker's report it will be seen that the athletic evening cost the committee \$138.88. This event was the very best feature of the carnival, but the affair was not properly advertised and the attendance was very slim. But for this the regatta would have been a financial success.

The field day this year was also a losing proposition. The cost of pulling off the athletic events was \$496.92, while the receipts were only \$388.75, leaving a deficiency of \$108.17.

In a way the regatta has been a financial success. The cost of building the grandstand, tearing it down and storing it away was \$428.25, but as the stand is at the present time, it is worth fully \$500. It can be used for six or eight years to come and can be counted as a valuable asset.

Mr. Parker's report to the Push Club was as follows:

"We, the regatta committee for 1901, having been appointed and commissioned by you to arrange and conduct the annual regatta of this year, beg leave to make report as follows:

## WAS AIDING INSURGENTS

**Panama Agent of Pacific Mail Steamship Co. Caught with Compromising Letters.**

### HE IS A NATIVE OF CUBA

United States Consul Investigating Case—Has Been Requested to Be Present at Company's Office and Examine Mail.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—A dispatch to the Herald from Panama says: General Alban, governor of Panama, has arrested Caesar Fernandez del Rio, a native of Cuba and acting agent for the Pacific Mail Steamship Company.

General Alban had learned, it is said, that compromising letters had been sent from points in Central America addressed to Von Dineken, cashier of the company. He went to the office of the company and made a demand for the letters. It was found that they had not been delivered, but in a drawer in Del Rio's desk, according to the government, two envelopes were discovered which when opened were found to contain other letters, one to Del Rio from a noted insurgent mentioning former correspondence and another for Domingo Diaz, chief of the insurgents in the department of Panama. Del Rio was arrested by General Alban personally and confined with common criminals in an underground cell. He applied, through U. S. Consul Guder, for release under guard until the steamship company could get a man here.

General Alban said he would consent if a deposit of \$4000 in cash was made; the sum to be forfeited if Del Rio communicated with the Liberales. Del Rio was later allowed to go to his office with a policeman. The deposit, however, was not made.

General Alban has invited Consul Guder to be present at the company's office after the arrival of the next steamer to see other mail from the same address. General Alban says he has assurance that important matter is on the way. He gave the consul a copy of all proceedings in the case including the testimony.

## CALL HAS BEEN ISSUED

**REPUBLICAN PRIMARIES TO BE HELD NOVEMBER 14.**

**Citizens Will Hold Mass Convention November 20—Their State Arranged.**

The opposing political factions are marshaling their forces for the city election to be held in December. Yesterday the Republicans issued a call for primaries to be held November 14 when delegates will be elected to the city convention, which is scheduled to meet November 21. The Citizens' committee also has determined upon a date for the convention, which will occur November 20. A call will be issued in the course of a day or two. It was at first proposed by the Citizens that primaries and a convention should be held in the regular manner, but the plan was abandoned as it there could not be any question as to the locality of the nominations.

As yet there is little talk among the Republicans of probable candidates. It is believed that City Treasurer Kearney, Street Superintendent Kearney and Surveyor Tee will be renominated, though whether or not the Republicans will again name H. E. Nelson for auditor has not been indicated. H. E. Nelson will, of course, in the contest for mayor and that for police commissioner. Aspirants among the Republicans have not yet announced their candidacies.

The Citizens will hold a mass convention, at which all voters will be entitled to vote. Candidates will be selected and then will be nominated by petition, unless there should be 100 or more voters in attendance. The convention will be held at Fisher's opera house on Wednesday, November 20.

The Citizens have practically completed their slate. It was generally expected that Leander Lebeck, whom Mayor Bergman tried unsuccessfully to appoint to the office of police commissioner to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Commissioner Schiele, would be nominated this year, but it now appears that W. J. Cook, at present councilman from the Second ward, will be the choice. Mr. Cook is regarded by the Citizens as one of their strongest men.

The Citizens will not again endorse Treasurer Kearney, if statements of party leaders are to be relied upon. The nomination will be tendered to Charles V. Brown, of the firm of Peterson & Brown, or to Dan B. Allen, son of Representative Allen. The slate as announced is as follows:

### GERMANS AGGRIEVED

Bitterly Resent Chamberlain's Reference to Francis-Gesing War.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—According to the London correspondent of the Tribune Englishmen have been noticing with surprise the bitter resentment excited in Germany by Mr. Chamberlain's casual reference to the Francis-Gesing war. It is a straw showing the direction of the wind in Germany, where, in spite of the emperor's cordial relations with the reigning house, here England is regarded as an industrial enemy and not a friend.

This revelation of anti-English feeling in Germany strengthens the desire of public men and the press in London for a settlement of all outstanding questions between England and America. An expression commonly heard is that good feeling with America will be worth more than the closest alliance with Germany.

The objections raised by Canada to a settlement of the canal controversy are attracting attention but the hope is entertained that Premier Laurier's influence will be exercised and that there will be no opposition from Ottawa to embassage the foreign office in opening a way for the adjustment of the entire series of Canadian questions.

### RIGHT OF APPEAL SUSTAINED

Admiralty Cases From Hawaiian Courts May Be Brought to Circuit Court of Appeals.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals has handed down an opinion sustaining the decree in favor of libellants in the United States District Court of Hawaii in the case of J. S. Low and John Pitts vs. the Wilders Steamship Company and the steamship Claudine.

The suit in admiralty was brought in the district court of Hawaii to recover damages for loss of cargo and personal belongings caused by a collision between the steamer Claudine and the barkentine William Carson, wherein the Carson was sunk.

The point was raised by the appellees that the act which made provision for the judicial system of the District of Hawaii does not authorize the removal of admiralty cases to the circuit court of appeals. The court held that it had jurisdiction.

### ARRESTED FOR MURDER

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Antonio Livorno, an Italian silk weaver, who says that he lives in West Sixth street, will be arraigned in the police court this morning, charged with murdering Frank Panizzone of Summit, N. J., on the night of March 17.

Livorno was arrested by Detective Sergeant Price and Petrosino, who found him at work on Fifty-Seventh street. Panizzone kept a boarding house in Summit and Livorno was one of his boarders. They quarreled because Livorno accused Panizzone of being lukewarm in his anarchist faith. They came to blows and Panizzone was struck over the head with a bottle and stabbed twice in the left breast. Livorno fled to this city and took the name of Vito.

Steamer Krag Phipps Wilhelm Ship to Trans-Atlantic Record.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Business men were surprised by the delivery of mails that left New York on Tuesday last, says the London correspondent of the Herald. The delivery was at least a day in advance of the usual time. Often it is Wednesday before they are delivered.

This remarkable record is due to the rapid passage of the Kron Prinz Wilhelm, which arrived at Plymouth at 18 minutes past midnight on Sunday, thus covering the 2975 miles in five days, eight hours and 18 minutes. This is only about an hour more than the fastest passage ever recorded, which was accomplished by the Deutschland.
