People living on the Lewis and Clark yesterday asked the county court to furnish powder in order that they may hunt out cement near the Chadwell schoolhouse. The cement will be used at the west end of the Lewis and Clark bridge. The court granted the request.

The local uniform rank of Knights of Pythias was organized in this city last evening by Colonel Will E. Hagen, of Sacramento. The following officials were chosen: Captain, George Nohrd; first lieutenant, O. B. Bates; second lieutenant, J. H. Hansen; recorder, John Nordstrom; treasurer, C. W. Perry; sentinel, Herman Wason; guard, Albert Martin.

The Catholic fair for the benefit of the church will be held in the building adjoining Danaher's store commencing this afternoon and will close Saturday evening. The ladies in charge of the fair have made extensive preparations for the event, and many interesting features have been planned. All kinds of fancy articles will be sold, and dinner will be served each evening after 5 o'clock.

Chris Simonson, of East Astoria, was quite badly injured yesterday afternoon at Bond and Twelfth streets, where a new building is being erected. The workmen were heaving a heavy tank to the roof of the building when the derrick gave way, the tank falling on Simonson and rendering him unconscious. He was soon revived, but his injuries will probably keep him indoors for several days to come.

The French bark Helan reached here yesterday morning from St. Nazaire, France, after a rattling passage of 130 days. The Helan is a new vessel and this is her maiden voyage. She is one of a fleet of bounty carriers now being built by the owning firm and is a flyer, like nearly all French vessels. Her interior furnishings are palatial and her quarters throughout are magnificent. The captain's wife accompanies him on the trip.

The Citizens' call for a city convention appears in today's Astorian. The slate published yesterday in this paper is admitted by party leaders to be about right. As far as is known the township nomination has not been settled. Neither C. V. Brown nor Dan H. Allen is very anxious for the nomination, but one of the two will unquestionably be selected. The Republicans are still non-committal and as yet no new candidates have been announced.

Captain James Keating's launch Eagle came near going to sea yesterday. While in the lower harbor she lost her rudder and started to drift to sea. The predicament of the launch was observed by the lookout at Point Adams and the lookout promptly hastened to its assistance. When the life-savers reached by the lookout at Point Adams and ward the breakers and soon would have been helpless at sea. A jury rudder was rigged and the launch accompanied by the launch to the city. There was a fall in the storm yesterday and four weather-bound vessels

got to sea. The Indravelli crossed out for Hong Kong and Yokohama, while the British bark Mayfield, the British ship County of Kinross and the German bark Favorita go to the United Kingdom with grain cargoes. The four vessels which departed yesterday took cargoes valued at more than \$500,000. The County of Kinross, the last of the quartette to clear, has \$3,840 bushels of wheat, valued at \$45,000.

The French bark Europe, which arrived some days ago from Hobart, Tasmania, neglected to secure a bill of health from the American consul there, and, as is customary, a fine of \$500 was imposed by Deputy Collector Parker. Yesterday word was received from the treasury department at Washington that the fine had been reduced to \$10. The captain of the Europe had secured a bill of health from the British consul and was informed at Hobart that this was sufficient. In view of the circumstances, the department remitted the fine.

What promises to be one of the most interesting features of the Catholic fair is the art gallery and museum, over the destinies of which two enterprising young ladies will preside. The irrepressible Frank Parnell Meany has been engaged as speaker. The museum will contain all sorts of wonderful exhibits, but the young ladies in charge have steadfastly declined to divulge the features, even to the other ladies at the fair. They are preparing the biggest kind of a surprise and contemplate a rush of visitors that will tax the capacity of the building. The museum will be opened tomorrow evening.

The November term of the county court was convened yesterday. A petition was read from D. K. Warren and others asking the construction of a road from the south end of the Youngs bay bridge to Meriwether Downs. Maxwell Young, T. H. Morrison and Hugh McCormack were appointed viewers. If the court determines to build the road a drawbridge over the Lewis and Clark will be necessary. Allen Anderson, Olaf Erickson and Otto Olsen were appointed viewers to examine into a request for a road from the Lewis and Clark drawbridge to the Fort Clatsop road. Frederick Olsen presented a protest against the action of certain parties in placing logs in the river at Olney. The matter was referred to Roadmaster Frye, with instructions to act. The court yesterday spent much time examining claims.

Considerable interest is being manifested at the approaching engagement of the polite musical comedy "Hunting for Hawkins" at Fishers' opera house next Monday night. While "Hunting for Hawkins" is strictly a farce comedy and does not contain one really serious line, it is not one of the absurd, plotless sort with which amusement seekers have been bored rather than entertained during recent years. It contains an entirely original, well defined and thoroughly interesting plot. The dialogue is said to be strictly humorous, and the situations irresistibly laughable. In the action of the

play all coarseness and "horse-play" is eliminated, and the comedy is therefore refined and wholesome. This is a virtue possessed by few of the latter day farce comedies, and will doubtless be appreciated by polite playgoers. The performance is enlivened with a number of specialties and the music, songs, dances and other vaudeville features, are said to be distinctly new and thoroughly enjoyable. The reserved seat sale opens Saturday morning at Griffin & Reed's.

Bad boys are making more trouble, and yesterday one destructive young man was arrested. With a number of other lads, the boy arrested has been making daily excursions to Youngs bay. There are several bathhouses there and the boys have broken into them, taken the boats and at times have destroyed cars. The houses were always kept locked but the boys broke the locks whenever they visited the bay. Yesterday William Beasley determined to make investigation and started for the other side of the hill. On his way over he met one of the boys and questioned him as to the possibility of securing a boat there. Unaware that he was talking to one of the injured parties, the boy told Mr. Beasley that he would have no difficulty in getting a boat. "Why, when I want one, I just break into the bathhouses and take it," said the lad. His arrest followed. A popular diversion with the boys has been to shoot the boats full of holes, and much damage has been done. It is expected the names of all the boys will be learned and that wholesale prosecution will follow.
