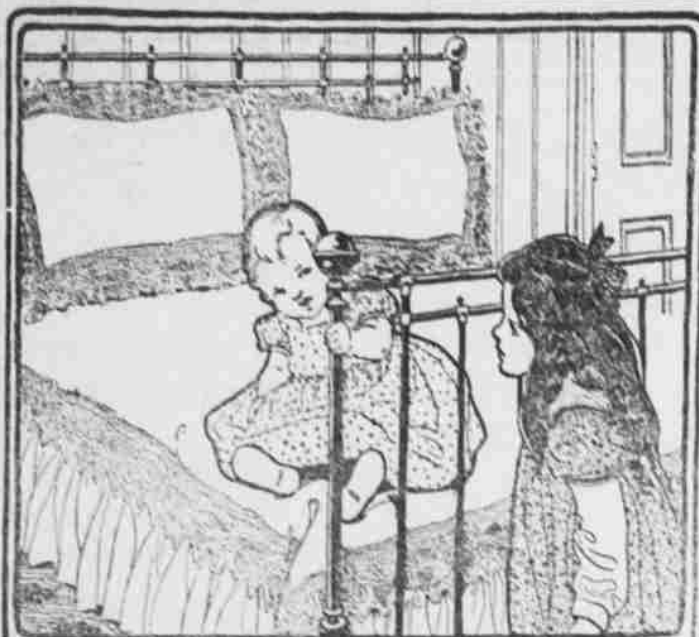

FOR POLISH INDEPENDENCE

Polish Students Circulate Pamphlet Proclaiming Poland Is Not Yet Lost.

MANY PROSECUTIONS BEGUN

The Prussian Government Adopts Strong Handed Policy and Is Determined to Crush Secret Societies.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The trial of 13 Polish students for belonging to certain secret societies in various universities was, says the Berlin correspondent of the London Times and transmitted to the New York Times begun yesterday.

Time prosecutor claims that these societies are united in a Polish League the object of which is the restoration of Polish independence. One student has confessed that he circulated 20 copies of a pamphlet proclaiming that Poland was not yet lost.

Polish secret societies says the correspondent, have been increasing rapidly and the Prussian government is determined to adopt a strong handed policy.

CUBAN COMMERCE.

Imports Exceed Exports by Two Million Dollars.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—The following comparative statement concerning the commerce of the island of Cuba for the 11 months ended May 31, 1901, and for the same period of 1900, and the total value of merchandise exported during the 11 months ended May 31, 1901, was \$57,739,885, as against \$40,417,683 for the same period of 1900.

The value of imports of the merchandise from the United States during the 11 months was \$25,832,163, a decrease of seven per cent. The value of exports to the United States was \$41,998,182, an increase of 23 per cent.

WILL DIVIDE PRIZE.

Santos-Dumont's Recognition of Services of His Co-Laborers.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—A dispatch to the London Times, transmitted to the New York Times, says M. Santos-Dumont will divide the Deutsch prize of 100,000 francs awarded to him on Monday by the committee of the Aero Club as follows:

Fifty thousand francs for the poor of Paris; 20,000 francs for M. Santos-Dumont's assistant, Emmanuel Alime and the remaining 20,000 francs to the Aero Club's other co-laborers.

CRITICISM CONTINUES.

Attempt to Justify Looting by Troops in China Fails.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—The Berlin correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times says, in spite of Emperor William's army order expressing warm recognition of the services of the German forces in China, criticism

of the soldiers and of the government for bringing the astronomical instruments and other loot from China goes on. The attempt to justify the looting by referring to the example of Napoleon and other conquerors is condemned.

The recent sentence of imprisonment on a Stuttgart journalist for labeling the Chinese expeditionary force, in an article in which he called the representatives "huns," has caused much discussion.

A GREWSOME FIND.

Eight Dead Bodies Found in Crates at a Chicago Freight Depot.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Eight human bodies were taken from two crates at the freight station of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad tonight. They were consigned to R. J. Jones, of Draper, Mo., and marked as second-hand laundry machinery. The bodies were purchased during the day from Harvey Medical College of this city, and were being shipped to Missouri for the purpose of dissection. The police are looking for Jones, but so far have been unable to locate him. The only charge that can be brought against him is shipping of bodies in a manner contrary to law.

VESSELS STRANDED.

England Visited by Severe Cold and Dense Fog.

LONDON, Nov. 6.—England is now experiencing the most severe cold known in years for this period of the year. Snow is falling at many points this morning.

From Messrs. Bristol Channel, Humber and Clyde arrive stories of destruction of traffic. A number of vessels have been stranded; there have been minor collisions on the Thames and hundreds of vessels are forbidden.

Five hundred Yarmouth fishing boats have been unable to return to port owing to the fog.

COAL MINERS STRIKE.

Refusal to Reinstatement Union Workmen the Cause.

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 6.—An order calling a strike at eight o'clock of the Temple Iron Company was issued tonight by the United Mine Workers of America.

The strike results from the refusal of the Temple Company to reinstate fifty workmen who had been discharged. The company employed about 400 men and boys.

OFFER SUBMITTED.

Panama Canal Company Would Sell All Rights to United States.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Huhn, of the Panama Canal Company has finally submitted to Admiral Walker, head of the Isthmian Canal Commission, a proposition on behalf of the company for the acquisition of all the rights by the United States.

He says the boys frequently have families of 20, half of whom die young.

NO LANDING EXPECTED.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—A dispatch from Admiral Callard, received here tonight, but dated this morning, announces that his squadron is still lying before the island of Mytilene. No landing has yet been effected. A heavy sea is running.

RELEASED UNDER BOND.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—Wooy Ho, a Chinese woman, arrested recently for being a subject of the Chinese Empire unlawfully in this country, has been released by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals on filing a bond in the sum of \$2500, pending an appeal to the United States Supreme Court. The defendant alleges that she was born in California and does not, therefore, come under the provisions of the exclusion act. The court commissioner decided that the evidence did not satisfy him as to the truth of her assertion and ordered her to be deported to China.

PRIZES FOR GRATORY.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Six thousand dollars has been given by Charles O. Baird of Philadelphia, the income of which is to be used toward prizes for gratory in the senior class at Princeton.
