Another brand-new French bounty-earner, the Francois Coppe, arrived yesterday. She comes from Hongkong and made the trip in 62 days. The Coppe is now on her maiden voyage and is fitted up in the luxurious manner that characterizes all new French ships. Captain Douet's wife accompanies him. All the French ships arriving this fall have been splendidly ballasted, in marked contrast with British vessels.

The bad boy who was arrested yesterday for breaking into Youngs bay bathhouses and destroying property there was released from the county jail Wednesday evening. This action was taken because his parents are highly respected people. The names of the other boys who have been pliffing on the south side of the city are known to the authorities, and if the depredations continue, wholesale arrests and prosecutions will follow. The officials have refrained from prosecuting because many of the boys come of prominent families, but this consideration for the parents will no longer be permitted to figure, and an example will be made of the next lad who misbehaves himself.

There was considerable excitement at Port Canby Tuesday night, when fire was discovered in the kitchen. An alarm was at once sounded and the blaze extinguished before it had gained headway. If either of those dignitaries informs the local colony of Li's death, flags will be placed at half-mast and a period of mourning arranged for. The death of anyone excepting the emperor does not receive any general notice in China, though an exception will probably be made in the case of Li. The local colony had just received a copy of the San Francisco Daily News, a Chinese publication, which contained a Pekin dispatch an-
