The trial trip of Captain Haddock's new steamer Electro will not occur today, as was intended, as it was found impossible to get her ready in time. The trial will be held some time during the week.

John Erickson, the returned Klondiker, is anxious to engage in shipbuilding, and the endless chain committee is figuring on the matter with him. Several sites have been shown, and it is expected satisfactory arrangements for a yard will be made shortly.

"Hunting for Hawkins" is one of the greatest musical comedies ever presented, and Astoria theatergoers will enjoy a rare treat Monday night. The sale of seats indicates that the house will be packed. Those who neglect to secure seats early tomorrow morning may find it necessary to stand.

The Astoria Football Club will begin practice this afternoon at A. F. C. park. The candidates for positions are enthusiastic over the prospects of good sport, and it is expected a first-class team will be got together. The personnel of the team will be announced after a series of try-outs.

The steamer Sue H. Elmore, with 14 passengers and 400 boxes of dairy produce, arrived in last evening from Tillamook, after the roughest trip of the season. She reports the tug George R. Vosburg lying off Nehalem bay, waiting for a smooth bay. The Elmore will sail for Tillamook again on Wednesday morning.

Mr. Harry Burkholder, one of the most popular steamboatmen on the lower river, has just passed a captain's examination in Portland. He will have charge of the new Callender steamer, Jordan, when she goes into commission. The Jordan, which is named after the well-known captain of the Callender, will ply between Astoria and Deep River.

It is announced that Al Neill, the clever California milk-stealer, and that uncertain pug, Mysterious Billy Smith, will fight in Portland. The chances are that the crowd will not be great enough to pay half rent. Smith is generally regarded as crooked, and after his recent fiasco with Tom Tracy there is no desire on the part of sports to again be gold-bricked. A large number of Astorians saw the last contest, but the coming mill is attracting absolutely no attention in this city. Neill is known as a square fighter, but his company in this particular instance is altogether too questionable for his own personality to inspire confidence.

Nerve is sometimes a good thing, but the request of the Chinese government that the entire diplomatic corps meet the emperor and the dowager empress outside the walls of Peking and welcome them back to the city was a little too much of a good thing for the Chinese under the circumstances.

Secretary of State Dunbar was in the city yesterday, shaking hands with his many friends here. A reporter made an unsuccessful effort to engage Mr. Dunbar in political conversation, the secretary excusing himself with the remark, "I never talk politics." Asked about his alleged gubernatorial aspirations, the secretary smiled blandly. He said he had not seen the Oregonian article announcing a determination to nominate him for the governorship, but characterized the story as hot air. He said he had no desire to be governor of Oregon, and that his name would not go before the next convention for that office. Mr. Dunbar left last evening for Salem.

Dozens of popular songs, ranging from the catchy "rag-time" to operatic selections, several cleverly executed dances and numerous other diversions are included among the valuable features. Dr. H. L. Henderson has just returned from Portland, where he met several prominent life insurance men from Seattle, Spokane and Portland. The meeting was held for the purpose of organizing a new life insurance company, on a strictly mutual basis, but with the large feature eliminated. It is the intention to combine the old-line endowment system, and also to pay sick and accident benefits to policy holders. The gentlemen with whom Dr. Henderson has been conferring are men of vast experience in the insurance business and have ample financial backing. While all the details of the proposed organization have not yet been worked out, it is expected the matter will be settled within the next 30 days. Dr. Henderson has made a strong bid to have the headquarters of the new company located at Astoria, with very bright prospects of success. The new society will be an innovation in the life insurance line and will, it is expected, be much more beneficial for policy holders.

Notice is hereby given, that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, has declared its determination and intention to improve and repair 11th street from the north line of Commercial street to the south line of Bond street in the part of the City of Astoria laid out and recorded by John McClure, and extended by Cyrus Olney upon the present established grade thereof and throughout the width from curb to curb between sidewalks by removing all the planking on said portion of said street between the sidewalk curbs and laying throughout the length of said part of said street to be improved two new stringers on each side of the center of said street (making four stringers to be laid through said portion of said street) said new stringers to be laid between stringers now in said street, and by planking said portion of said street throughout the width thereof from curb to curb between sidewalks with good sound fir plank 4 inches by 12 inches in size.
