YAQUI VS. MEXICANS.

For some time past the dispatches have contained much regarding the conflict now going on between the Yaqui Indians and Mexican troops. It is simply a spasmodic affair between a lawless tribe of Indians and the Mexican government, like those through which our own people passed in opening up and settlement of the West. It would not be worthy of the notice given it, but such is not the case. In this instance the Indians are the ones who are striving for better government and more individual liberty, with the ultimate purpose of annexing Mexico to the United States. Though Indians, they are above the average Mexican in everything that makes a man. They have never surrendered their rich valley to the domination of the Mexicans, and it is doubtful if they ever will. They are not savages—no more than the Boere are. They are thrifty, intelligent and progressive, as may be seen from a recent proclamation setting forth their grievances, which declares that "the tendency of civilization is to make nations of continents, since it is as easy to govern a continent in these days as a county one hundred years ago. Hence it is unjust that the people of North America should support three governments when one is sufficient. Two of the three governments of North America exist under false pretenses. Their constitutions, modeled after that of the United States, are mockeries used as cloaks to cover their tyranny. They support themselves by oppressing the weak and submissive, by destroying the brave and unyielding, and by living on the charity of the great republic from which they draw their revenue. It is the duty of the United States to see that these miserable and criminal governments cease to exist, since they have proven that they do not deserve to exist, and it is the purpose of the Yaqui people to assist the United States in that duty. The Yaquis seek the destruction of the Mexican government not only to avenge the expulsion of the Yaqui women and to prevent the extermination of the Yaqui race, but for the benefit of the entire continent."

Many years may elapse before the ambition of these soldiers of liberty will realize the fruition of their hope, but their struggle is one that will appeal to the average American citizen, who wishes them God-speed in their noble undertaking. It would seem the Astoria Evening News (God save the mark) has taken umbrage at several news items gleaned by our reporter from the local political field. If we are to judge, from the effusion that appeared in its columns last evening, our misnamed contemporary strenuously objects to the Morning Astorian publishing real live local news. Such enterprise is beyond the comprehension of its news-gatherers and in its estimation is deserving of condemnation. We are of course sorry to be the cause of humiliation to our neighbor but if it does not want to suffer by contrast we, as a bit of friendly advice, can only say "you will have to hurry" in order to keep up with the press. The Astorian is here to print all the news of interest to the community regardless of whose eggs are broken.

The first day's shooting of the deer season in Wisconsin has resulted in three fatalities. Year after year the story of people being maimed and killed by men who mistake them for deer, is reported. Last year the number of these killings in Wisconsin alone, averaged more than one for each day during the season. It is inconceivable for any man who calls himself a sportsman to make such a mistake and if some of these careless fellows were properly punished, this class of accidents would become less numerous. Such carelessness is criminal and should be so treated.

The logging industry of the Lower Columbia river promises to experience the most profitable season this winter in its history. News comes from Portland that there is a shortage of logs at all the mills there and that it will tax the logging camps of the lower Columbia to their fullest capacity to furnish logs as fast as they will be required. This is good news for the loggers of this section and will prove of great benefit to the merchants of Astoria, as this city is the supply point for all the logging camps of the lower Columbia.

When it comes to settling United States senators, H. W. Corbett is not in it. Simon, Mitchell, or almost anybody, is good enough for that kind of windward, but when it comes to doing things, such as are of great benefit to Oregon, Corbett is there every time and towers head and shoulders above all others. Last Saturday Mr. Corbett started the subscription for the Lewis and Clark Centennial at Portland in 1905 by pledging \$50,000, or one-tenth of the entire amount to be raised—Oregon State Journal.

Mavis Bodell has broken the world's record for 25 miles unswum, at the 25 mile road race of the King's County Wheelmen on Long Island. Bodell, who started from scratch made the course in one hour and six minutes winning the time prize and breaking the world's record of one hour and eight minutes.

After a year's fight the city council of Chicago has passed an ordinance requiring the Illinois Central, Lake Shore and Michigan Southern, Pittsburg, Fort Wayne and Chicago, Pennsylvania, Nickel Plate and Baltimore & Ohio Railroads to elevate their tracks. The measure provides for the elevation of 16 miles of track within six years at an estimated cost of \$2,000,000.

It is rumored that the National Salt Company has absorbed the Colonial Salt Company of Akron, Ohio, which has one of the largest plants in the country. The Colonial Company was backed by the Armour & Swift Packing Companies, who were unable to buy salt from the National Company at a satisfactory price and it is believed that the latter has now made terms with the packers.

According to the officials of the New York Central Railroad, the British government has decided to send Australian mails from London by way of San Francisco and New York instead of from Sydney to London by way of Colombo, Aden, Brindisi and London.

The tea duty repeal association, consisting of some of the leading wholesale grocers, jobbers and importers of tea in this country has just been organized in New York City. G. Waldo Smith, of Smith & Sils, president of the Wholesale Grocers Association of New York City and vicinity is president. The object of the association is to secure the removal of the tariff of ten cents a pound on tea imported into this country.
