There will be services morning and evening tomorrow at the Congregational church. The morning service will be under the auspices of the Ladies' Missionary Society. Sunday school at 12:15 and Christian Endeavor meeting at 6:30 p. m.

The British steamship Cranley yesterday finished her cargo, and is now ready for sea. She took on at Astoria 356,720 feet of piling, valued at \$257, and 4,515 feet of lumber, valued at \$423. She goes to Manila and Tsingtau, China.

The funeral of Pauline, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Boudier, will take place this afternoon. Services will be conducted at the family residence at 14th and 2nd streets. The interment will be at Greenwood.

The British ship Crown of India arrived down the river yesterday. She had some trouble at the hogback, but was floated without difficulty. It is understood her charterers ordered her held at the hogback until her lay days expired but changed their minds when the tide came in and the tug went to the vessel's aid.

Tomorrow services will be held as follows in the Methodist church: At 11 a. m. a sermon will be delivered by Rev. E. L. Rockwell, and after the sermon the sacrament of the Lord's supper will be observed. At 7:30 p. m. the pastor, Rev. H. Oberig, will preach, taking for his subject, "Returning From Dreamland."

The Oregonian denies that Mark Hanna had anything to do with the noticeable changes which have recently taken place in its policy. Commenting on the story, the Portland paper says: Mr. Scott never received a communication of any kind, verbal or written, by letter, messenger, telegraph, telephone, through a friend or visitor, or through a spirit medium, from Mr. Hanna. He has not the honor of personal acquaintance with Mr. Hanna; never met him, never saw him; is not aware that Mr. Hanna ever desired to see him—as he certainly never had any desire to see Mr. Hanna. Astoria sports are very much disappointed with Gus Ruhlin. While victory for the Akron giant could not reasonably have been looked for, it was thought he would make a better showing and at least put up a game fight with the champion. Those who have followed ring events for years "called the turn" in the first round. Ruhlin began at once to claim protection from the referee, which is always a bad sign. In the second, when the bell rang, he showed that Gus had all the best of it, a pleased expression came over the faces of the watchers, whose sympathy was with the under dog. But in the third round, the under dog, "That pug went in to win on a fluke and

he'll never last," said a well-known sport. After the second it was realized that it was just a question of time. Ruhlin played "baby" all the way through and there is very little sympathy for him in this city.

Mrs. Matt Hilstrom, of the Lewis and Clarke, was in the city yesterday. Mrs. Hilstrom is now supporting her four children and at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon was seen on her way home, a distance of four or five miles, carrying an armload of packages. While in the city a short time ago she expressed a desire to visit her husband, who is in the asylum, and was assured by Sheriff Linville that the opportunity to see the husband would be afforded whenever a woman patient was taken to Salem. Mrs. Hilstrom will be taken along as a guard. Her husband has made no improvement since being sent to the asylum, after the killing of Lake Moore. He thinks he is running the state asylum, and that he can depart whenever Sheriff Linville desires it. He recently told the superintendent that Governor Geer had given him carte blanche, subject to the approval of Sheriff Linville. His hard-working wife is supporting her children, the oldest of whom is a sickly boy of 14. Recently Mrs. Hilstrom's little girl was very badly burned, but is now about well.

The committee in charge of the ash and door factory proposal is still waiting on A. B. Hammond. When the proposition was first taken up Mr. Hammond was written to. Yesterday, a letter from him not having arrived, the committee wired, asking whether or not he would donate the site asked. He wired a reply to the effect that he had written fully with regard to the matter. The committee expected to get his letter yesterday, but it failed to arrive. If the letter does not come by noon today, Mr. Hammond will be asked to wire its contents. The proposition submitted by Mr. Butzer is perfectly satisfactory, and Mr. Hammond's reply to the request for the site is all that is delaying progress. President Van Dusen, of the Chamber of Commerce, who owns part of the land, asked, has not yet given the committee an answer, but it is thought he will gladly donate his share if Mr. Hammond does likewise. Should Mr. Hammond decline to give the property, another side will be donated. The matter will doubtless be finally settled by tonight.

At the north line of Duane St. 24.5 ft. above said base of grades. At the south line of Exchange street 24.1 feet above said base of grades, the slope of said street between said designated points to be straight or gradual.

That the Auditor and Police Judge of said City has been directed to give notice of the intention of the said Council to establish the grade of said portion of said street as aforesaid by publication for ten days in the Morning Astorian said publication to be made and said notice to be given in the manner provided by the Charter of said City, by resolution adopted November 4, 1901. Notice is hereby given, that the Common Council of the City of Astoria, has declared its determination and intention to improve and resurface 13th street from the north line of Commercial street to the south line of Bond street in the part of the City of Astoria laid out and recorded by John McClure and extended by Cyrus Olney upon the present established grade thereof and throughout the width from curb to curb between sidewalks by removing all the planking on said portion of said street between the sidewalk curbs and laying throughout the length of said part of said street to be improved two new stringers on each side of the center of said street (making four stringers) to be laid through said portion of said street and new stringers to be laid between stringers now in said street; and by planking said portion of said street throughout the width thereof from curb to curb between sidewalks with good sound fir plank 4 inches by 12 inches in size. All material used in said repair and improvement shall be good, sound and of yellow fir and said improvement shall conform to the requirements of general ordinance No. 1501 in relation to the improvement of streets.
