The Electro fully comes up to expectations and will doubtless prove the peer of lower river steamers of her class.

The meeting Friday night was quite general, among members, all agreeing that the club should live if interest could be revived. The Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company has decided not to sell its Nushagak cannery. At the meeting held Friday the committee in charge of the negotiations with the Ontrov company reported that it had no definite proposal to submit from the new combination, and accordingly all negotiations looking to sale of the cannery were dropped. It was the sense of the stockholders that Charles Lindstrom should be sent North next year as general superintendent; the former manager having tendered his resignation.

It is felt that, under the management of Mr. Lindstrom, the cannery will be even more successful than it has been in past years, and that it is an investment worth keeping. The determination of the company to not sell its plant is good news to Astoria merchants, who have received large supply orders from the concern.
