Fulton on the afternoon and evening of Friday, November 22. The sale begins at 2 o'clock, and a large variety of useful articles will be offered.

County Clerk Wheeler is in receipt of a letter from the editor of the World Almanac, asking that a list of local millionaires be sent for publication in the almanac. Mr. Wheeler is anxious that all Astoria millionaires send in their names to the office, that he may forward them, as per the request of the almanac editor.

President Gaston, of the Push Club, yesterday announced the personnel of the committee on manufactures, as follows: G. C. Fulton, H. L. Hambley, Harrison Allen, C. W. Carstensen and J. E. Gratie. This committee will have for its object the encouragement of new enterprises and will work in conjunction with other similar committees.

County Judge Gray has received word from Salem that George Root, who was committed to the asylum from this county on February 19, had died on the 15th inst. Root, it will be recalled, came here from Clatsop county, where there seemed to be an effort to deprive him of his property. He was quite old and his death was not unexpected.

The matching of "Mysterious Billy" Smith and Al Neil has aroused little interest in this city. Neil is a first-class fighter and bears the reputation of being square, but Tom Tracy was also held in high esteem before his recent fight with Smith. Local sports generally express regret that Neil has become mixed up with such very questionable company.

Three of the weather-bound grain fleet got to sea yesterday. The Italian bark Carlos P., bound for the United Kingdom, was the first of the trio to cross out, the British steamship Crusader and the German ship Rickmer Rickmers following. The Crusader goes to the Orient and the Rickmers to Queenstown. The steamer Harrison departed for Nehalem.

Among the claims allowed by the county last night were several incurred at the time a case of smallpox was reported in the city. The case was brought to official notice just before the

regatta, but so quietly did the officials and Dr. Ordiner work that nothing was publicly known of it at the time. The bill incurred in this matter aggregated \$25.00. The claim presented by Douglass Peterson for \$30, allowed to be justly due him for taking care of a discarded Kelly horse, was allowed in the sum of \$15. Peterson's stipend for the past month was \$4.50.

At last night's meeting of the council Mr. Parker created something of a sensation by announcing that the city had been touched. The crime is said to have been committed in connection with the painting of No. 3 engine house, to do which work the councilman alleged, required more paint than was needed to paint the largest residence in the city. It is estimated by Mr. Parker that some unprincipled wretch made off with fully 60 pounds of white lead. The repairs to the engine house have caused much discussion among members of the public property committee but now, thank fortune, the matter has been entirely settled.

Captain Winkle, of the steam schooner Sequoia, which arrived yesterday from Eureka, reports the loss of a fireman on the trip up the coast. On Saturday afternoon, during heavy weather, the unfortunate man fell overboard with the launching of the vessel. The steamer was stopped and was backed up almost to the fireman when, with a cry, he threw up his hands and sank from sight. The Sequoia brings 20,000 feet of California redwood to constitute part of the miscellaneous cargo of the bark Harlette, now loading for the Orient. Redwood is in good demand in the Orient and two vessels have arrived here within a week, carrying nearly 100,000 feet for the Far East supply.

The cash and door factory proposal will be finally concluded by tonight. Yesterday the committee visited some of the businessmen and presented the petition to them. Good headway was made and the committee is satisfied that the necessary \$4000 will be raised by tonight. This evening Judge Taylor and Mr. Whipple will leave for Portland to arrange the terms of the location of the mill. Just as soon as the cash and door factory is secured the committee will take up several other big enterprises, the prospects for landing which are bright. In soliciting funds yesterday the committee met with only one refusal, and it is expected that the firm in question will make an appropriation.

District Manager Kendall, of the American Can Company, has returned from a visit to the Sound. Messrs. Norton, also connected with the can company, have returned to the East, and will make a report on the local situation. Just what this report will be has not been announced, but it is expected it will be favorable to keeping the factory here. Today Mr. Kendall and General Agent Mayo, of the A. & C., will go to Portland, there to confer with representatives of other transportation companies with reference to adjustment of rates. There is not the slightest question that the matter will

be satisfactorily settled and that the local factory will be enlarged, in accordance with the plan recently outlined by Mr. Kendall.

The first of the series of handball games were played at the Commercial Club court last evening. Two of the games were quite exciting and were very much enjoyed by the spectators. G. H. Oiler and R. L. Mills were pitted against W. Shinnott and A. Osburn. Oiler and Mills took all three games, winning by scores of 21-20, 21-6 and 21-11. Ben Marion and George Kallston also took three straight from C. R. Thompson and H. C. Thompson, winning by scores of 21-16, 21-20, 21-14. The following teams will contest tonight: Frank Woodfield and E. L. McCabe; Bert Allen and Jay Tuttle vs. Charles Stockton and W. Thomas. In this tournament each game won counts one point. The series promises to be an interesting one, and much interest is being manifested in the outcome of the games.

During the past two weeks ten vessels have cleared foreign from this port, carrying cargoes valued at \$553,431. Nine of the vessels carried wheat and flour, while the other—the steamship Crusader—takes a miscellaneous cargo, made up in part of lumber and piling. The Crusader is destined for Manila and Tientsin, China, and her cargo is valued at \$22,719. The grain vessels clearing during the two weeks were: British ships Nelson, County of Kinross, Lady Isabella, Lyland Bros. and Crusader; French barks Bourbaki and Marechal Davout; German ships G. H. Wapaus and Neosax; Norwegian ship Albusia. The amount of wheat carried by the nine vessels was 73,761 bushels, valued at \$433,212. The Lady Isabella had only a small portion of wheat, the bulk of her cargo being 45,186 sacks of flour, worth \$57,590. With the exception of the Crusader, all the vessels are bound for Queenstown or Falmouth, for orders.

The Norwegian steamship Horda arrived Sunday from the Sound. She will load at Portland for the Orient. The Horda arrived off the river late Saturday night and had a narrow escape from collision with the British ship Torridon. It was very thick at the time, and while the lights of the Torridon were seen by Captain Svenson, of the steamship, he thought the vessel was the pilot schooner and did not change his course. The Horda was rapidly bearing down on the Torridon when Pilot Matthews flashed danger lights. Instantly the engines of the Horda were reversed, and the steamship barely missed the Britisher. Had the Horda kept on her course for a few minutes longer, she would doubtless have run down the Torridon. When the vessels met the Torridon was very close in and the Horda's captain presumed the unknown vessel ahead was the Pilot, that would keep out of harm's way. A collision would probably have resulted in great damage, but fortunately the Horda was able to sheer off.
