H. H. Pinnell, formerly of Astoria, but now a businessman of the Cariboo mining district, arrived in the city last evening. He will spend the holidays with his parents.

Sunday services will be held at Grace church as follows: Morning prayer, with sermon by the Rev. T. A. Hyland, at 11 o'clock. Sunday school at 12:30. Evening prayer at 7:30. Service at Holy Innocents, East Astoria, as usual at 1:30.

At the Baptist church all the usual services will be observed tomorrow. At 11 a. m. the pastor will present and deliver the third sermon in the study of the Acts, "The Witnessing at Pentecost." In the evening the subject will be "Thanksgiving."

The local customs officials have not yet received word from the treasury department as to what action will be taken in the case of the British ship Latimer, which arrived from Rio de Janeiro without the necessary bill of health.

At the First Congregational church services will be held tomorrow as usual. The pastor will preach at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. Theme for the evening, "Christian Science." Y. P. S. C. E. at 6:30. Sunday school at 12:15. Prayer meeting, Wednesday evening, at 7:30.

The storm and heavy rains which have prevailed for the past few days will enable nearly loggers to get out their logs. Nearly 20,000,000 feet of logs are in the streams in the vicinity of Astoria, but the water had been so low that the timber could not be got to the water.

The regular session of the Women's Club will be held at Page hall at 2:30 this afternoon. The topic will be "Puritan Day." Miss Emma Warren will officiate as chairman. The session promises to be one of unusual interest and a full attendance of members is requested.

Martin Ford yesterday announced that he would not be a candidate for the office of police commissioner. Mr. Ford stated that he had at first determined to accept the nomination, but later, after consulting with F. R. Stokes, his business associate, had concluded that he would not make the race. Lack of time to attend to the duties of the office is assigned by Mr. Ford as the reason for his failure to accept the nomination. The Republican city central committee will probably meet next week and choose new candidates for mayor and police commissioner.

The Astoria acquaintances of George P. Clark, one of the experts who examined Clatsop county records, were very much surprised to learn of his arrest for obtaining money under false pretenses. Clark declares his arrest is the result of a conspiracy. He asserts that Mrs. O. N. Denny, executrix of the estate of O. N. Denny, deceased, gave Mr. Clark a written order directing George P. Clark to sign for two warrants, aggregating \$25, which were due the estate of O. N. Denny, deceased, and that Clark signed for

the warrants, assigned them to Block and received the money, which was paid over to Mrs. Denny.

C. B. Norris, of the A. Booth Packing Company, arrived in the city yesterday. Mr. Norris is in the West on a tour of inspection. It has been reported that he would make another effort to effect a consolidation of canneries here, but no such effort will be made by him unless he receives satisfactory assurances from packers that they desire to consolidate.

Mr. Butler arrived in the city yesterday to consult with the local committee regarding the establishment here of the cash and floor factory. The details of the matter were discussed yesterday, and last night Mr. Whipple said he had no doubt everything could be arranged satisfactorily. Indeed, so far as the factory people and the committeemen are concerned, there is not the slightest hitch, but one or two obstacles must be overcome.

Ralston and Marion clinched their lead in the handball tournament at the Commercial Club last night, when they defeated Stockton and Thomas in three exciting games. Stockton and Thomas had played some excellent ball and it looked for a time like they would be easy winners. Last night, however, they lost three straight, surrendering first place to their opponents. The scores were: 21-19, 21-17 and 21-9. Tonight McCabe and Peterson meet Simons and Osburn.

"Dan Mahoney's Wedding" was presented to a fair-sized audience at Fishers' last night. J. L. McCabe, who plays the title part, is the whole show and his clever work last night was very much appreciated. His support is not any too strong, however, and altogether the play was a disappointment. It is one of those silly pieces that compel one to laugh and fill him with regret that he was compelled to give vent to his merriment. Mr. McCabe's parodies on popular airs, particularly that on "The Blue and the Gray," were excellent.

The people of Albany, this state, have raised a cash bonus of \$5000 to keep a chair manufacturing concern in their town. Portland offered \$2000 for the enterprise, but the company preferred the Albany location. Albany has only half the population accredited to Astoria, and while there is not very much business in the Valley town, the people there are always on the alert to secure new enterprises.

Seven instruments were filed for record yesterday, two of which were mortgages, the amount involved being \$5900. There was one power of attorney from F. J. Norton, of this city, to C. R. Thomson. Of the deeds one was from F. J. Norton, of this city, to C. R. C. B. Allen, the property transferred being 250 feet of frontage adjoining the Washington cannery property on the west. The consideration was \$5000. Another deed is from A. V. and C. B. Allen to William E. Talant, the land involved being a two-thirds interest in the Washington cannery property. The consideration is named as \$10,000. Two other deeds transferring East Astoria

property, were also filed, the considerations aggregating \$430. The total amount involved in yesterday's transactions was \$21,520.

According to the provisions of the city charter, Auditor Nelson and Street Superintendent Kearney may accept either of the two nominations tendered them without in any way offending the finer sensibilities of the political parties. The charter specifies that, where a candidate has been named by two parties acceptance of one of the nominations is equivalent to acceptance of both, and that if only one is accepted there is no vacancy so far as the other is concerned. Thus, Auditor Nelson might accept the Citizens' nomination, for instance, and his act could not be regarded as a thrust at the Republicans, for under the law in accepting one nomination he could both. The charter provision in question follows: "A certificate of nomination may be accompanied by the acceptance of the nominee, in which case the acceptance shall be indorsed upon the certificate of nomination and signed by the nominee, or it may be by a letter or telegram from the nominee attached to the certificate of nomination and filed therewith. If the certificate of nomination is not thus accompanied by the acceptance of the nominee, he may at any time after the certificate of nomination is filed, and before the time for filing nominations for such offices has expired, file his acceptance thereof in the same manner in the same office where the certificate of nomination is filed. The officer with whom it is filed shall indorse the same and attach it to the certificate of nomination to which it refers. Several different certificates of nomination may thus be filed, nominating the same person, and one of said nominations, if it shall be sufficient and shall be equivalent to accepting each of said nominations to the same office." Last election both Auditor Nelson and Street Superintendent Kearney accepted both nominations, and it is not at all unlikely that they will do likewise this year.

NUMBER OF REGISTRATIONS.
Eight Hundred and Twenty Names Appear on the Books to Date.

The total number of registrations up to the close of business last night was \$20, or 230 less than were cast in the last city election. Polling places No. 2, No. 3 and No. 4 have made large gains during the past week, though there is a noticeable deficiency in polling place No. 1. Indications are that the total number of registrations will exceed the number of votes cast in the last municipal election, but that the normal vote of the city will not be cast this year.

The total number of voters registering during the week was 194, of which 67 registered in the First ward, 23 in the Second ward and 14 in the Third ward. While the showing made is not a gratifying one, it is thought voters will awake to the necessity of registering, and that the total will exceed that of the election held last December, when three councilmen and a police commissioner were chosen.
