Dr. W. C. Logan has almost completed the work of grading his lot at the corner of Franklin avenue and Tenth street. Water was used for grading and remarkable results were obtained. Property owners are offered an excellent opportunity just at present to grade their lots by means of sluicing and those who have property should take advantage of the condition. Dr. Logan's lot will make excellent residence property.

For the fourth and last time, the sale of folio property was again postponed yesterday until Monday, January 6, at 10 a. m. Sale was to have been made December 2, but another postponement was deemed advisable, and at the adjourned session of the county court the January date was fixed. This will give delinquent property owners still further opportunity to settle their taxes, and will doubtless prove a great convenience to many.

The war department has not yet notified the county court of the location for the proposed drawbridge over the Lewis and Clark river, but the court has instructed the surveyor and surveyor to proceed with the work of laying out the route of the road, which will extend from the south end of the Youngs bay bridge to Merwin. If the location selected by the surveyor does not correspond with that ordered by the department, the course of the road will be altered.

The department at Washington has dropped the charges against Private Milner, the Port Canby recruit whose troubles have been recounted in this city press. Young Milner has been returned to duty and hereafter will be a soldier in the service of Uncle Sam. The 1st enlisted first in California, according to his parents to be false and he was sentenced to three months' imprisonment. Later he was released, again receiving a discharge at his age. The facts were ascertained the second time and the matter was reported to the department. When the circumstances were related, however, the department failed to be misled with the fact, whose main desire in life has been gratified.

At an adjourned session of the county court yesterday the resignation of C. M. De Sener, keeper of the Warrenton workhouse, was received and accepted. R. J. Abbott was appointed to fill the vacancy. He was received for replacing the Lewis and Clark drawbridge, Madison & Harwood offering to do the work for \$187 and \$16 per thousand feet for extra lumber required for the work. L. Lebeck's bid was \$100 for the entire job. Madison & Harwood were awarded the contract. Fred Krueger presented a petition stating that it was his intention to hold the property responsible for any damage that might result to his land from the neglect in manner in which the bridge was installed there. The matter was referred to R. J. Abbott. The court adjourned yesterday until next month.

Lighthouse Nelson has gone to the county jail for 60 days for stealing some points from a building boat. The articles were taken a week ago last Saturday and were located at a postoffice. Lighthouse was arrested for the crime and his trial took place yesterday before Judge Brown. He entered a plea of not guilty, demanded a jury trial, but was not represented by counsel. Lighthouse set up the contention that the boats were given him by a stranger, who met him on the street, and asked him to take them to the depot. He said he proceeded to the place, but that the stranger did not get in an appearance. The story didn't sound very good to the jurors and Lighthouse was found guilty. Judge Brown sentenced him to 60 days in jail. The man who let the property is named Erickson.

Unless death comes off some of the candidates for city offices, the respective city committees will have no more trouble about nominees. A big bunch of acceptances was filed with Auditor Nelson yesterday, and there are candidates for every office. The Republican nominees are: Mayor, J. W. Suprenant; auditor, H. E. Nelson; police commissioner, J. W. Babbidge; treasurer, E. J. Carney; street superintendent, J. F. Kearney; surveyor, A. S. Teet; councilmen—First ward, E. P. Parker; Second ward, Ludwig Larson; Third ward, John Nordstrom. The Citizens' candidates are: Mayor, Louis Bergman; auditor, H. E. Nelson; police commissioner, W. J. Cook; treasurer, Thomas Dealey; street superintendent, J. F. Kearney; councilmen—First ward, P. August Jahstrom; Second ward, G. W. Morton; Third ward, P. C. Reed. Judge Nelson and Street Superintendent Kearney have accepted both nominations, so there can be no feeling over the matter. If the Republic's election of their candidates, Messrs. Nelson and Kearney will probably be known as Republican office holders; if the Citizens are generally successful, they will be called nonpartisan.

The petition of J. K. Wirt, an independent candidate for street superintendent, has been declared irregular, and the name of Mr. Wirt will not appear on the official ballot. The petition was signed by only forty-nine voters, the law requiring fifty signatures, and the signers did not give their places of residence. These defects have invalidated the petition.

Some days ago the Astorian published a report to the effect that the Commercial Club initiation fee would shortly be reduced, and it became generally believed around town that this would be done. At a meeting of the trustees last evening, it was decided to reduce the fee to \$5, as intending members were waiting for the reported reduction. The \$5 fee will apply to all applications received before January 1st.

THE DEAL IS CLOSED.

Smith and Door Factory Proposition Has Been Finally Accepted.

Judge F. J. Taylor and W. W. Whipple returned last evening from Portland, where they closed the Smith and door factory proposition. In conversation with a reporter last night, Mr. Whipple said:

"The deal was closed in Portland today. All the arrangements have been completed, and on Saturday members of the firm will arrive in the city to make the necessary survey. As soon as this work is finished, construction of the factory will be begun. The start will be made before the expiration of another week."

Mr. Whipple added that it was the intention of the company to install a sawmill of its own, and that at an early date.

Speaking of the Hammond letter, published yesterday, Mr. Whipple said the railroad president had neglected to put himself on the same and door factory business and that his deductions were not at all logical. It is Mr. Whipple's intention to prepare a reply to the letter. "I think the letter was intended as a 'knock,' " said Mr. Whipple, "but it came too late to have the desired effect. So far as I am concerned, I'm out for Astoria, first, last and all the time. If a greater Astoria means that Mr. Hammond's plans are to be interfered with, then that gentleman must get out of the way. It appears to me the sentiment is pretty general that those who do not wish to assist

in the effort to build up the city must go away back and sit down."

MORE THAN NINE HUNDRED.

Number of Registrations Is Rapidly Nearing the Thousand Mark.

Before the present week is over the number of registrations will exceed 1000. If indications can be depended upon as correct, up to the close of business last night 928 persons had observed the formality, and from the manner in which voters congregated at Auditor Nelson's office during the day it is evident the vote will not be as far short as was at first expected. Indeed, there is now some hope that the total number of registrations may reach 1200. The number thus far registered is only about 100 short of the number of voters at the last election. The largest increase has been noted in polling place No. 2, which is the most populous in the city. A statement showing the registrations in the several wards follows:

SOME UNWRITTEN HISTORY.

How Lewis and Clark Escaped Death at the Hands of Indians.

Wade Hampton Smith, of Fort Clatsop, who has been in the city during the week, relates an interesting story of the narrow escape of the Lewis and Clark party from massacre by the Indians. The story was related to Mr. Smith by the daughter of the chief of the Clatsop tribe of Indians. The Indian princess was a little girl when the incident occurred, but she said she remembered Captain Clark quite well, and always thought Mr. Smith was the explorer. Indeed, she was so firmly convinced of this that she always called him Captain Clark. In telling the story an interpreter was necessary, as the Indian princess would not lower her dignity by using a foreign tongue. According to her story, a ship was wrecked near the mouth of Tillamook bay many years before the arrival of the Lewis and Clark expedition. A few of the sailors perished, but the survivors succeeded in reaching shore, where they were cared for by the Tillamook Indians. Clothing and food were furnished them and everything else possible was done for their comfort. The shipwrecked sailors showed little appreciation of the efforts thus made in their behalf, and soon became most unruly, violating the usages and customs of the Indians. The head man of the tribe expostulated with the whites and tried in every manner possible to have them respect the Indian customs. The sailors evidently were a depraved lot, and the result was that the Indians put the entire crew to death.

This was the first experience the Tillamooks ever had with white men. It is presumed, and the impression left on the Indians was not a gratifying one. So, when Lewis and Clark and their explorers settled at Fort Clatsop, the Tillamooks determined to stamp out the whites before they were afforded an opportunity of mistreating the Indians. The Clatsop chief was a good old man, it appears, and notified Captain Clark of the intention of the Tillamooks. Prior to that time the Clatsops were permitted inside the stockade at the fort, but when the contemplated massacre was made known to the whites the Indians were denied admittance inside the fort. The Tillamook chief was as good as his word and came up from his village with a large force of warriors. The Clatsop chief went out to meet him in friendly conference, explaining that the whites were all good men and that the Indians would profit by their advent. At first the Tillamook warrior was obstinate and determined to massacre the whites, but the Clatsop chief finally talked him out of the notion, and the Tillamooks returned to their village.
