OVERDUE WING AND WING FINALLY REACHES PORT

Little Vessel Was Towed in Yesterday by the Tender Mammilla. After a Trying Experience.

The little schooner Wing and Wing, long overdue from San Francisco for Sunday bar, was towed into port yesterday afternoon by the United States lightship tender Mammilla in a locking condition. The schooner's sails were nearly all blown away, and her water supply was entirely exhausted. Captain Anderson reports a trying experience.

The Wing and Wing sailed from San Francisco October 1 with a general cargo. She arrived off Sunday October 15, but was unable to cross in, and no tug came to her assistance. Soon afterward a gale came up and drove the vessel to the north. Ever since October 18 she has been buffeted about by the elements.

Two weeks ago the schooner struck a leak and the water came up rapidly in the hold. The pumps were started day and night, however, and the vessel was kept afloat. During the last week the schooner's condition was such that the Mammilla was ordered to tow her. The Mammilla, after a long and trying experience, succeeded in towing the schooner into port. The vessel is now being towed to the wharf by the tugboat.

LORD KITCHENER EXTENDS LINES

Blockhouses to Form Chief Factor in Pacification of the Country.

HAS NOT SUFFICIENT TROOPS

To Carry Out Comprehensive Operations Simultaneously North and South of Delagosa Line

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The editor-in-chief of the London Times and New York Times at Pretoria says that in order to cope with the large number of Boers which keep in touch with the infant General Botha east of the line of blockhouses from Wilge river to Greylingstad 12 British columns are operating between the Delagosa and Natal rivers.

In the Western Transvaal the columns under Lord Methuen, Colonel Kekewich and Colonel Hulse are sweeping the country in conjunction with the forces on the railway line and the constabulary posts. It seems says the correspondent that the blockhouses are to form the chief factor in the pacification of the country. The new lines of blockhouses will soon enter the Pretoria-Johannesburg road and free it of the enemy.

The concentration of Boer columns south of the Delagosa railway have withdrawn the troops north of the line, with the result that the Boers are back again in that neighborhood where horse sickness and fever do not prevail and food is plentiful.

Lord Kitchener says the correspondence has never sufficient troops to carry out comprehensive operations simultaneously north and south of the Delagosa line.
