

ORGANIZED LABOR IN CONVENTION

The Delegates Present Represent More Than a Million and a Half Workingmen.

LARGEST CONGRESS YET HELD

Color Line Raised Upon Question of Admitting Delegate from Central Labor Union of Richmond, Virginia.

SRANTON, Pa., Dec. 5.—Two hundred and eighty-five delegates, representing more than a million and a half workmen responded to call at the opening session of the twenty-first annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which was called to order by President Samuel Gompers, this morning.

The convention, is said to be the largest congress of workmen ever held in this country. Organization, settlement of questions involving contested seats, and reading of the annual report of the president, secretary and treasurer took up the entire session of the convention. During the day there was one surprise sprung on the delegates and one important decision made.

The Cherokee enrolling party of the Dawes Commission has returned to Muskogee after a stay at Tahlequah. They secured the names of only about 200 full bloods to the roll.

The Rev. Dr. Carl Meyer, one of the oldest professors in Rutgers College, is dead at his home in New Brunswick, N. J., from heart disease. He was more than 80 years old.

The publishing business of Earl & Dumont has been placed in the hands of a receiver. Dumont has filed a petition in bankruptcy, asking to be relieved of an indebtedness of \$250,000. The assets amount to \$457,000.

The president of the International Olympic committee, Baron Vouhourin, of Paris, has written a letter to President Roosevelt, asking him to accept the honorary presidency of the Olympic games to be held in Chicago in 1904.

Since the new German tariff bill was proposed, there has been a perceptible change in the tone of the Anglo-German press in regard to Germany. It may be that the long standing intimacy with Germany has lost some of its popularity.

According to the New York World, Theodore Molkinton, once a crack horseman of the German army, will attempt to break the world's record for long distance riding by traveling from New York to Chicago in seven days without changing horses.

Bryn Mawr College for young women has been offered \$250,000 by John D. Rockefeller for certain specified improvements provided that on or before commencement day in next June the sum of \$250,000 shall be raised to complete the projected work.

The Stanford Intercollegiate debating committee has agreed to the terms proposed by the University of Washington for a joint debate. It is proposed to hold two contests, the first at Stanford April next, the second at the University of Washington at a date yet to be fixed.
