The United States cruiser Philadelphia has come from the Mare Island Navy Yard, where she has been undergoing repairs and is now awaiting orders at San Francisco. It is expected that she will go to Panama.

Father W. J. O'Kelly, the Catholic priest who injured his hand while fishing at Rockaway Beach a month ago, and who refused until too late to allow one of his thumbs to be amputated for the reason that he feared it would interfere with his work as a priest, is dead, the result of blood poisoning.

Word has been received by the New York police from Detective Sergeant McCaffery of his arrival in Liverpool with William Hoegener, whom he arrested in Buenos Aires. The detective and his prisoner will sail from Liverpool in a few days.

De Wet is reported to be close to Hellhorn with 2,000 men and to have come very near surrounding Kitchener's fighting scouts, under Colonel Wilson, says the London correspondent of the Tribune.

The army transport Hancock is scheduled to sail from San Francisco for Manila on the 16th of this month with 1,100 soldiers of the Twenty-seventh Infantry who will come from Chicago. The Sheridan will be in readiness to sail at the same time but it is as yet undecided whether she will be ordered away so soon.

A dispatch from Tokyo to the London Times and New York Times says the action against the cabinet which was apprehended from the chief political party is now unlikely. The party has adopted a courageous manifesto, which does not indicate any hostile intention and displays obstruction. It is probable that the session of the Diet will pass off quietly and that the budget will be adopted without radical amendments.
