RECORD YEAR FOR POLICE RECEIPTS

Almost \$9300 Collected in Fines and Forfeitures in the Past Twelve Months.

Remarkable Increase Due to the Greater Amount of Gambling Among the Residents of Chinatown.

after paying the expenses of the department there will be a balance over to assist other departments of the city government.

The receipts for 1901 aggregated \$9296, or \$2804 more than was realized in 1900 and \$2147.50 more than was received in 1899. The amount received during each month of the past year exceeded the receipts for the same month of the two previous years, and the showing in every respect is a remarkable one.

Chief Hallock attributes the big increase in receipts not to any increase in drunkenness, but rather to the greater number of gambling games. Each game is required to contribute \$25 monthly for the privilege of doing business, and it is from this source that the money comes. The Chinese have been gambling heavily during the year, although the number of games in white gambling houses has been somewhat less than in former years. It is very difficult for the police to "keep cases" on the Chinese games, as the Celestials open one day and pay their license and, experiencing a streak of hard luck, go to the wall before another night rolls around. However, as soon as one falls another takes his place, and often one game will pay several fines during the month, because of the change of management. NEWS OF DAY BRIEFLY TOLD

Marconi Planning to Transmit Messages from England to South Africa.

SENATOR DEPEW AND BRIDE

George Herron a Chicago Socialist Addresses a Large Meeting in Brussels—Will Go to Philippines.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—The steaming steamer Albion will soon be sent to the Philippines, where she will go into the trade between Manila and the other ports of the group.

DENVER, Dec. 31.—The board of aldermen have adopted Alderman Kelly's ordinance, compelling electric light, telegraph and telephone companies to put their wires underground.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The board of United States general appraisers has adopted appropriate resolutions, expressing regret because of the retirement of Lyman J. Gage from the post of secretary of the treasury.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—According to the Herald, a special from Ottawa, Ont., says Mr. Marconi, who is here planning to increase the power of his wireless telegraph station in Cornwall with a view to the transmission of messages to points in South America and Africa.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—The Call says James I. Frazer, superintendent of the Western Division of the Southern Pacific Company, with headquarters at Oakland, has tendered his resignation in order to become the general superintendent of the Toledo, St. Louis & Western Railway.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—According to the Herald a theater is to be established in New York by Charles Frohman with a French company of players of the first rank, to produce in French, plays of the classic and modern school.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 31.—It is asserted, according to the Chronicle, that the pending negotiations for the sale of the North Pacific Coast Railroad to the syndicate of capitalists represented by Colgate of New York, John

Martin of this city and others are likely to reach a successful conclusion by the middle of January.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—United States Senator Dewey and his bride, after a luncheon on board the steam yacht Lysistrata with James Gordon Bennett, left to travel by easy stages to Cherbourg, where they will take the American line steamship St. Louis for the United States next Saturday, cables the Nice, France, correspondent of the World.

BRUSSELS, Dec. 31.—Prof. George D. Herron formerly of Chicago, who addressed a large meeting last evening at the Maison du Peuple, declares that seven-eighths of the total of the fortunes in the United States were monopolized by two thousand individuals, "the masters of the trusts." The only solution of the situation, he said, was a revolution.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—A special to the Herald from Philadelphia says that Mme. Sybil Sanderson has just announced her engagement to Comte Henri de Fitzjames, an officer of cavalry in the French territorial army. He is a son of Edouard Due de Fitzjames, the head of the second or French branch of the Berwick family.
