The regular meeting of the Astoria Progressive Commercial Association will be held this evening. This will be a very important meeting and besides the members any others who may be interested in seeing the work of the association are invited to be present.

The 19-year-old son of Mrs. William Dees, 204 Exchange street, fell through an opening in the sidewalk yesterday afternoon, sustaining a fracture of the leg besides minor injuries.

Pilots report that the government engineers are now sounding the south channel at the mouth of the river. This indicates that the channel is to be marked with buoys as was asked by the shipping men.

Captain Gibson, of the British ship Blackhawk, which arrived Monday evening from Table Bay, was in town yesterday. The captain reports that he was delayed by head winds and a foul bottom, and that his vessel is not a very speedy ship.
