Fire Chief Stockton was kept busy yesterday watching chimneys. The extremely cold weather resulted in increased use of fuel and burned 5 and 6 last night several flues turned out, threatening adjoining buildings. In every instance, however, the sparks were prevented from doing damage.

The school term of school district No. 9 will open the first Monday in March and the directors are anxious to secure a teacher before that time. Wise is the postoffice of the district and those desiring to secure the position should send in their application at once.

The ways and means committee yesterday awarded to the Evening Budget the contract for printing city notices for the ensuing year. The rate agreed upon is 60 cents per square for the first insertion and 25 cents per square for each subsequent insertion. The contract has been signed.

Great Chief of Records Wm. C. J. R. Pohl left for Clifton last night to organize a tribe of Redmen at that place. The steamer Mayflower was chartered for the occasion and left her dock at 6:30 carrying about 20 members of Sacramento tribe and about an equal number of Concomly tribe; of this city, to attend the exercises. The new tribe will start out with 20 charter members and will choose its own name. The Mayflower will return this morning with the visitors.

It is now improbable that all the contestants will finish in the Commercial Club bowling try-out by February 1. To date about half a dozen men have completed their games. W. C. Laws finishing high, with an average of 42. Laws averaged 45 up to his 6th game, when a bad kipnap cut down his average. Other players also suffered for the same cause. New new pins and new balls have been provided and all the bowlers are averaging well. The three-men teams are being arranged and the series will shortly be commenced. Medals have been ordered from J. H. Seymour, and will be well worth winning.

The prevailing cold snap is making business for the plumber, and half the residences in town were afflicted with broken pipes yesterday. Considerable damage was wrought at the North Pacific brewery, where pipes to the value of about \$100 burst. The damage will not cause suspension of operations at the brewery. The predicted snow began at an early hour this morning, and will doubtless continue for some time to come. Reports from the Sound are to the effect that everything is tied up there on account of the snow, while east of the mountains the thermometer has dropped to zero. Between smallpox and the influenza, the Sound cities are having a hard time.

The chemical had a narrow escape from collision with a rapidly moving street car while responding to a fire alarm Friday night. Commercial street is torn up near the engine house and it was necessary for Driver Cordes to take Bond street. He started down Eleventh and just as he was about to round the corner at Bond the street car showed up. With commendable presence of mind, the driver turned his horses in the opposite direction and proceeded along Bond with the car until the motorman was able to bring it to a standstill. Then the chemical was headed in the right direction and hastened on to the fire. The engine was driven squarely in front of the car and barely missed it. A collision would have resulted in great damage and probable loss of life.

Samuel White, of Baker City, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, arrived in Astoria yesterday. Mr. White will remain in this city for several days. Yesterday he met Democratic leaders of Clatsop county and talked over the situation with them. In the afternoon Mr. White and Hon. John H. Smith left for Seaside, where they will spend Sunday. Mr. White's visit is made for the purpose of repairing any breaks he may find in the political fences in this county. He will have but little to do here, as the Democrats of Astoria are united just at present. It is stated that the Democrats of the state will make a vigorous campaign in the forthcoming election, considerable ginger having been injected into the situation by the new committee chairman. Mr. White is a hustler, and if there is any chance for the success of the Democratic ticket next June he can be relied upon to take advantage of it. He will visit all 100 counties in the state before the election is held and will get local workers out. The meeting of the state committee occurs on Wednesday, and Mr. White will be in Portland to attend the gathering of the clans. J. E. Campbell is the local member of the committee.

When the steamship Columbia arrives at her dock this morning, she will be met by Chief of Police Hallock and a squad of men. It is believed that two desperate criminals are on the steamship and the local police have been asked to capture them. The men are "Kid" Goucher and a man known as "Brownie." According to the confession of Jack Wade, one of the accused, Goucher and "Brownie" are supposed to have killed Policeman James Robinson in San Francisco a few nights ago. The crime was one of the most daring ever committed in San Francisco and the police there are greatly worked up over it. The thugs were in desperate circumstances and held up the police officer. The officer attempted to defend himself, but the thugs shot him down, and he died shortly after being removed to the hospital. Wade was wounded by one of the policeman's bullets and was captured. After a short stay in jail he confessed, implicating the two men who are thought to be on the Columbia. They are said to have stowed away on the steamship. Both men are hardened criminals, and the task which has been prepared for Chief Hallock and his men is a dangerous one. The steamship is due to arrive at daylight.

The San Francisco officers seem to be satisfied that the desperadoes are aboard the Columbia. A great many murders and hold-ups have occurred in the Bay City during the last few months, and, as the two men are thought to have been implicated in the crimes, their capture is greatly desired. If caught both will hang for the murder of Policeman Robinson. Chief Hallock has a full description of the thugs, and will doubtless be able to recognize them, even though they disguise themselves.
