## THREE ACCIDENTAL DEATHS.

Record for One Day in Snohomish County and Everett.

EVERETT, Wash., Jan. 27.—Three accidental deaths occurred in Snohomish county today. While returning from a hunting trip near Arlington, K. E. Thorndike's rifle went off accidentally, the bullet entering his abdomen. He lived several hours.

There Vaugnness was instantly killed by a friend while returning from a hunting trip at Stanwood. The shot gun accidentally exploded.

Martin Frazer was found dead in his room here. The cause of death is not yet known.

## CHINESE EXCLUSION ACT.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The senate committee on immigration today continued the hearing on the subject of Chinese exclusion. The time was taken up by representatives of the federal commission of labor and the state of California, who submitted arguments in reply to John W. Foster, who spoke last week before the committee in opposition to the pending measure.

## DEATH OF GEORGE LAUMAN.

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 27.—News was received today that George Lauman, a resident of Spokane, died last night at York, Pa., as the result of a stroke of apoplexy. He leaves an estate valued at a quarter of a million dollars, principally invested in real estate in Spokane, Seattle, Walla Walla and Waterville and in timber holdings on the Sound.

## COST OF WEST INDIES.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The senate today, in executive session, received the treaty with Denmark transferring the West Indies possessions of that country to the United States. The exact consideration specified in the treaty to be paid by this country is \$5,000,000.

## DAY IN THE HOUSE.

BBH Creating Home for Teaching Articulate Speech Defeated.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The house today adopted a resolution calling for documents relating to the old training ship Vermont, which was placed out

for the establishment of a home for the teaching of articulate speech of deaf children was defeated. The house adjourned until Wednesday.

## SCHLEY'S GREAT RECEPTION.

CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—The last day of Admiral Schley's sojourn in Chicago was full of interesting incidents. Reception followed reception, and it is estimated that during the day the admiral shook hands with more than 5000 persons, men, women and children.

## WAS FAVORABLY REPORTED.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—The senate pension committee today reported favorably Senator Mitchell's bill granting pensions to survivors of the Indian wars that took place between 1817 and 1856.

## BREAKS THE RECORD.

PORTLAND, Jan. 27.—At the Multnomah Club tonight H. W. Kerrigan broke the American record for a running high dive, clearing the bar at six feet and seven-eighths of an inch.

## MURDERER CAPTURED.

BILLINIS, Mont., Jan. 27.—Charles Woodard, who admits he is the murderer of Sheriff Riker, of Casper, Wyo., was captured this afternoon 13 miles west of Billings and brought to this city tonight. Woodard's capture was effected by Wilson Owens and John Berkheimer after a hard battle.

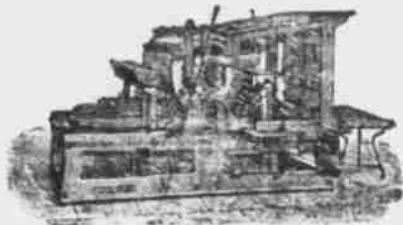
