INTERCHANGABLE TICKETS.

Trunk Line Association to Establish Mileage Bureau.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The Trunk Line Association has it is understood, virtually decided upon the establishment of an interchangeable mileage bureau, to have charge of the preparation and accounting of 2000 mile tickets, interchangeable on any road in the association. Final arrangements, however, have not been concluded.

This action is in response to a petition of more than 2000 merchants in a trunk line for the establishment of an interchangeable mileage bureau. The board like the body engaged on this movement some time past, and although final details have not been arranged, the outlook seems favorable for the adoption of the interchangeable mileage system.

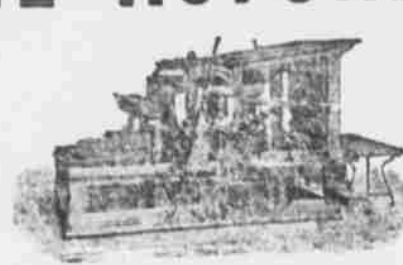
