The bowling committee of the Commercial Club has selected W. C. Laws as captain of the team, and practice games will be held regularly from this time on. It is understood the series of games with the Irving Club will shortly be commenced.

It is not at all likely that Sheriff Lunville and his deputies will be able to commence the collection of taxes tomorrow, as the clerk has been delayed with the roll. Perhaps on Wednesday the work of collecting will be begun. Some time during the present year all the delinquent property on the books will be sold, and thereafter the clerk will not be required to go over the roll.

The new steamer Alarm, just built by Richard Leathers for the Columbia River Packers' Association, was launched yesterday afternoon. The Alarm, whose name perpetuates the memory of a boat that once was a familiar sight on the Portland waterfront, will be used as a cannery tender in Alaska. Her engines have been built at the Astoria Iron works. She will be ready for service within a short time. Mr. Leathers will next commence work on the big boat to be built for James T. Barron for use on the Sound.

One of the best football games ever played at Ilwaco took place yesterday afternoon, when a Portland team met defeat at the hands of the Ilwaco team. The home aggregation outplayed the visitors, but the Portlanders put up a plucky game and the contest proved very interesting. Ilwaco won by the rather unusual score of 3 to 0, three goals being kicked by the home team. All the scoring was done in the first half, during which the visitors were on the defensive. In the second half the Portland crowd smoked up and tried hard to score a touchdown, but the Ilwaco team held them down. The game was free from the disagreeable squabbles that usually characterize such contests, and the visitors are loud in their praise of the treatment accorded them. A large crowd saw the game. The Portland players arrived in this city yesterday afternoon and will not leave for home until tonight.

The work of collecting funds to aid the cause of the patriot Boers will occupy fully a month. The local committee has selected Hon. John Hahn treasurer. It is expected by members of the committee that \$1000 will be subscribed in this city. Already several wealthy Boer sympathizers have forwarded large amounts from Astoria to assist the struggling patriots. The committee now at work will not undertake to make any canvass, but will cause small posters to be printed and placed in prominent places. Those who wish to subscribe may do so.

The United States lighthouse tender Mananita, Captain Gregory, returned to port yesterday, after an absence of 23 days. While away the Mananita visited the aids to navigation on the Sound and landed coal, supplies and buoys at several stations. It was the intention to stop at Destruction Island on the return trip, but this was impossible on account of the stormy weather. While at Seattle the Mananita was on Moran Bros.' drydock for a day, receiving a few patches of new copper on the bottom. This was the first time she had been out of water for three years.

At last evening's session of the Swedish Lutheran conference, very able addresses were delivered to a large audience. Rev. C. E. Frisk, of Tacoma, spoke on George Washington, and Rev. N. J. W. Nelson, of Moscow, Idaho, spoke on the relation of the young people to the church. Most of the delegates and ministers went to Seaside yesterday. This evening Rev. G. A. Anderson, of Spokane, the retiring president of the conference, and Rev. B. L. Nystrom, of La Conner, Washington, will preach. On Monday the pastors will hold private sessions, and in the evening of that day a farewell meeting will be held.

After being storm-bound for a long time, eight deep-water vessels got to sea yesterday, when an offshore wind prevailed and the mouth of the river was smooth. The vessels departing were the German bark Lata, the British ship Bry, the German bark Bertha, the British ship Brucroas, and the British ship Cambrian Warrior, all bound for the United Kingdom, and the barkentine Addenda, for Valparaiso. The Oriental liner Pembroke-shire also got out, taking a heavy cargo. The Pembroke-shire had made a long stay in port and Captain Kennedy was glad to get away. The British steamship Hataasu put to sea for Vladivostok, Tsing-tau and Shanghai. The departure of these vessels required the services of eight pilots. The other vessels departing yesterday were the Elmore for Tillamook, and the Elder and Alliance for San Francisco. The schooner Antelope arrived from San Francisco. She is under charter to load supplies for the Columbia River Packers Association's Alaska cannery.

When the Scott case was resumed before Circuit Judge McBride yesterday afternoon Juror Fred Sherman was not in his seat. Dr. Finch, Mr. Sherman's physician, appeared in court to state that the patient was still quite sick; that he would be unable to act on the jury yesterday, and perhaps would be too ill to appear on Monday. Mr. Fulton, Judge Bennett and Mr. Noland agreed, after some discussion, to proceed with eleven jurors. One of three courses was open: The present jury might have been discharged and 12 new jurors empaneled; a new juror might have been sworn in, or the case could be continued with only eleven jurors. The latter course was decided upon. The plaintiff's attorneys have all along stoutly contended that the wreck in which Engineer Scott was killed was due mainly to the 45 per cent slope of the embankment, which, it was contended, was so steep that slides could not be prevented. J. Q. Jamieson, a railroad engineer, testified yesterday that 45 per cent was the slope usually found on Western railroad embankments. At 4:30 the case was continued until Monday morning.

The Oregonian of yesterday, in discussing the senatorial candidacy of C. W. Fulton, said the Clatsop statesman would ask the Republican state convention to endorse him, and went on to remark that many opposed such endorsement of any candidate, on the ground that nine months is altogether too long a time to elapse between the endorsement and the election. Senator Fulton has not asked the convention to endorse him, but his name will doubtless be brought before that gathering for an expression. At the last session of the state legislature the Mays law was passed. This law provides that senatorial candidates shall be voted upon by the state conventions, so the legislature may have some definite idea of the preference of the people as reflected through the political gatherings. It is believed the name of Mr. Fulton and those of other senatorial candidates shall be vot-
