KANSAS TORNADO.

PLEASANTON, Kas., April 29.—A tornado passed through this county last night and demolished many houses and barns. William Fouts, a farmer, was fatally injured. Three others in the Fouts family were badly hurt.

AN EXPLOSION.

LEWES, Dela., April 29.—An explosion which injured half a dozen persons, but none seriously, occurred on the submarine boat Fulton today at Delaware Breakwater. The explosion was caused by an accumulation of gas which had been generated by a storage battery. Although the explosion was violent, the vessel was only slightly injured.

INSTANTLY KILLED.

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 29.—Miss Rose Grath, 19 years of age, was instantly killed yesterday evening by a falling tree. The young woman's mother was also severely injured. The two women were driving in a buggy when a dead tree was overturned by the wind and fell across the buggy, striking the younger woman in the head, breaking her neck.

CHOLERA FATAL.

MANILA, April 29.—Cholera statistics to date are: Manila, 665 cases; 453 deaths; provinces, 1765 cases; 1281 deaths.

GOLD DISCOVERY.

BUTTE, April 29.—Accounts from Sand Creek, the scene of the recent rich gold discovery, tell of a general stampede to the new fields. The ground for a radius of 16 miles has been staked off, miners leaving their work to make locations in the vicinity of the rich strike.

CONDEMNED IN MISSOURI AND CONFISCATED IN NEW YORK.

Judge Clarke of St. Louis has convicted and fined heavily a number of grocers for selling baking powders containing alum. The week before the Health Department of New York seized a quantity of stuff bearing said for baking powder which they found was made of alum mixed with ground rock and dumped it into the river. The Health Authorities are thus taking effective means to prevent the introduction into our markets of injurious substitutes in place of wholesome baking powders. As alum costs only two cents a pound, there is a great temptation for those manufacturers who make substitutes and imitation goods, to use it. Alum baking powder can be detected by the health authorities by chemical analysis, but the ordinary house keeper, whose assistance in protecting the health of the people is important, cannot make a chemical examination. She can easily know the alum powder, however, from the fact that they are sold at from ten to twenty cents for a pound can, or that some prize—like a spoon, or glass, or piece of crockery, or wooden ware—is given with the powder as an inducement. As the people continue to realize the importance of this subject and consumers insist on having baking powder of established name and character, and as the health authorities continue their vigorous crusades, the alum danger will, it is hoped, finally be driven from our homes.
