The Board of Trade and Push Club of the city are hand in glove with the movement and when prominent citizens volunteer to sacrifice their own interests in an endeavor to promote the general welfare of the public, it is time for all classes to chime in to the extent of their talents.

In connection with the importance of the regatta, it may also be stated, that San Francisco athletic clubs annually govern their actions by including Astoria in the circuit of sports and in consequence give an air of importance to the city, that is heralded abroad by the mighty power of the Associated Press.

Custom House, Astoria, Ore., April 29, 1902.—Supplies for revenue vessels.—Sealed proposals for supplying rations and coal to vessels of the United States Revenue Cutter Service, regularly stationed, or temporarily, at Astoria, Oregon, and delivered on board said vessels at that place during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, will be received at this office until 1 o'clock p. m. of Tuesday, May 13, 1902, at which time and place they will be publicly opened. The coal furnished to be anthracite or bituminous of best quality; uniform in character; to weigh 2240 pounds to the ton; to be delivered on board the vessels at such times and in such quantities as may be required, at localities readily accessible to said vessels, and to be subject to inspection as to quality and weight. Bidders will name the prices both for steaming and stove coal, and also their facilities for furnishing the vessels with fresh water, and their charges therefor. Blank forms of proposals, with schedules showing component parts of rations, may be had upon application to this office; proposals must be submitted on these forms. Separate bids will also be received at the same time and place for lubricating and illuminating oils. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids, and no proposal will be accepted until Congress shall have made an appropriation for the purpose.

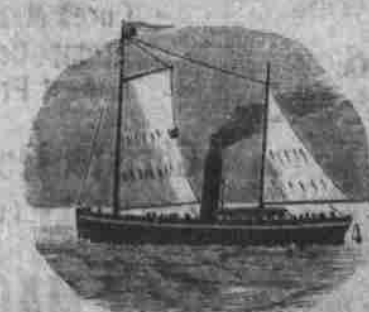
