It is also a notorious fact that the police stand in with the lawless element and by means of a systematic levy, a license for crime is given, and with crime licensed by law the only element with which it can be subdued, it is expected to run rife and reach the wildest state. This, doubtless, aided in suggesting the assault on Miss Stewart. Her's, however, was not a case of the kind against which prejudice legitimately exists. Her work was especially commendable. It was true Christian work. She went about it in an intelligent way and a way that was winning. She went quietly into the dens of unfortunate girls and had heart to heart talks with them. But few of these women are continuing in their degraded life from choice but have drifted there and once there see no hope of getting out. The person who can find a way for them to a better life and take them by the hand and lead them to it performs one of the greatest acts of humanity within the province of earthly power.

While the assault upon Miss Stewart is shocking to every one except the brutes who committed it yet it may be the means of great results. Her work might have never been known had it not been brought out by reason of the assault. Her plan is so feasible and so sure of success that other women throughout the country will take up the work and thousands of women may through this means be rescued from a life of shame.

In the meantime as long as the law licenses crime, tenderloin districts will continue to exist and terrible crimes will be committed, as the one is the natural result of the other.
