ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

Department of Oregon G. A. R. Will Hold Forth Here in June.

General orders No. 6 issued by J. E. Mayo, assistant adjutant general of the G. A. R. for the department of Oregon, by command of J. A. Staden, department commander fixing the time for the 21st Annual Encampment June 4, 5 and 6, and Astoria is named as the place.

Following is the program as far as made up: I. The Twenty-first Annual Encampment of this Department will be held at Astoria, Oregon, on the 4th, 5th and 6th of June next.

The department commander hopes that there will not only be a full attendance of the Delegates elected there-to, but there will also be a large attendance of the Comrades and their families from all parts of the state. Our Comrades at Astoria are making ample arrangements for the accommodations of all who attend, and will give them a hearty welcome and an enjoyable time.

Rates for meals and lodgings at hotels and boarding-houses will be published later.

II. The Department Headquarters will be established at the Occident Hotel on the morning of June 4, 1902.

III. The Council of the Administration will meet at the Occident Hotel at 1 o'clock p. m. of June 4, 1902.

IV. The following will be the program of exercises during the continuance of the Encampment, so far as the same can be now ascertained: WEDNESDAY, JUNE 4.

1. At 2 o'clock P. M. the annual parade will take place, forming in front of the Occident Hotel, and will start promptly at the hour.

2. At the termination of the parade, the several organizations will proceed to their place of meeting, the Encampment assembling at the Odd Fellows' Hall, where it will be formally opened for business, the reports of the officers presented, and committees appointed.

THURSDAY, JUNE 5.

1. The Encampment will meet in the morning, and continue its session until noon, when it will be adjourned until the next morning in order to take part in the entertainment provided by the Comrades of Astoria.

2. In the afternoon the Grand Army and its kindred organizations will participate in the entertainment provided by Cushing Post of the visiting Comrades and all attending the several meetings.

3. At 7 o'clock P. M. the Grand Army, the Women's Relief Corps, the Ladies of the Grand Army, and the Sons and Veterans will assemble in front of the Occident Hotel and will march thence to Foard & Stokes' Hall, where a public reception will be held, to be followed by a banquet and a campfire.

FRIDAY, JUNE 6.

1. The Encampment will resume its session in the morning when the business will be concluded, to be followed by the joint installation, and the Encampment will then be adjourned in ample time for the evening trains and boats.

2. Reduced fares upon transportation lines have been asked for, and as soon as known will be published to the Comrades. It is, however, safe to say that they will be the same as heretofore, namely, one and one-third full fares for the round trip to Astoria and return.

3. The Committee on Credentials will consist of Comrades J. E. Mayo, Assistant Adjutant General, C. A. Williams, and M. L. Pratt. Delegates' badges will be furnished upon application to this committee.

4. Comrade J. P. Shaw of Liding Post, No. 14, will detail one Officer of the Day, one officer of the Guard, and a sufficient number of Comrades to properly guard the place of meeting during the session of the Encampment. They will report to the Assistant Adjutant General of this Department.

5. The commander of the Cush-cob-Garfield Post, No. 3, is hereby detailed as Acting Assistant Adjutant General, to serve as such during the session of the Encampment, and will report to duty to Comrade J. E. Mayo, Assistant Adjutant General.

"HIT DOG HOLLERS!"

"When Sam Jones, the humorous evangelist, made it too warm for any one in his audience, which he often did," said a citizen yesterday, "the person would often get up and walk out of the meeting with an indignant step. The preacher would stop and exclaim, 'the hit dog always hollers.'"

"The Astorian's editorial on dogs yesterday did not only hit dogs too numerous to mention but hit some of the owners of worthless dogs. It was generally commented upon, but not always favorably.

"Owners of dogs always see some value in their dogs, it matters not how worthless they may be, and anything that is calculated to curtail the liberty of the dogs in the city brings a storm from some of the dog owners.

"A good dog is properly appreciated and the man who keeps a good dog is to be congratulated, but the rank and file of the Astoria street dogs are not worth killing. If the dog license law was rigidly enforced it is possible that the number of worthless dogs on the streets would be decreased."

Speaking of the men being left on the barge abandoned at sea by the tug Sampson, on account of the tug having broken her hauser, a prominent citizen said yesterday that the proceeding was remarkable to one who was not in a position to know the real facts connected with the case.
