The republic of Santo Domingo, except Port of Puerto-Platan East and capital, Santo Domingo on the south coast is in the hands of Dominican revolutionists, commanded by Vice-President Vasquez, who with considerable number of troops was expected to arrive before Santo Domingo today.

NEW YORK, May 2.—At the 13th annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Morris K. Jessup was re-elected president. Other officers elected include Whitelaw Reid, Clement A. Griscom and Charles Lanier, vice-presidents; James G. Cannon treasurer, and George Wilson as secretary.

COMMITTED SUICIDE.

BOISE, Ida., May 2.—A special from Payette, Ida., says: Emilie Marquardson committed suicide last night by shooting. Marquardson was sent to the pen not long ago for stealing cattle. The supreme court reversed the judgment and he was released. The matter of conviction seems to have preyed on his mind.

PROPOSALS WANTED.

Custom House, Astoria, Ore., April 25, 1902.—Supplies for revenue vessels.—Sealed proposals for supplying rations and coal to vessels of the United States Revenue Cutter Service, regularly stationed, or temporarily, at Astoria, Oregon, and delivered on board said vessels at that place during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903, will be received at this office up to 12 o'clock p. m. of Tuesday, May 13, 1902, at which time and place they will be publicly opened. The coal furnished to be anthracite or bituminous of best quality; uniform in character; to weigh 2240 pounds to the ton; to be delivered on board the vessels at such times and in such quantities as may be required, at localities readily accessible to said vessels, and to be subject to inspection as to quality and weight. Bidders will name the prices both for steaming and stove coal, and also their facilities for furnishing the vessels with fresh water, and their charges therefor. Separate bids will also be received at the same time and place for lubricating and illuminating oils. The right is reserved to reject any or all bids, and no proposal will be accepted until Congress shall have made an appropriation for the purpose.
