A Fourth of July celebration is good for a community. It sets up the position of the people. It sets a good example before the young. It is good for the business men. It is good for the country. The significance of the date cannot be overestimated. It was not only the beginning of American independence but the opening of a new era in nations. It was the beginning of freedom throughout the world. The march may have been slow, but it has been advancing. Step by step our country has been enlarged; monarchies, kingdoms and empires have gradually followed in our footsteps in a spirit of liberality to their subjects and most of them are now only monarchies, kingdoms and empires in name. The foundation was laid for this great work when the handful of colonists met and signed the American Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776.

American citizens of all others have the greatest right to celebrate this date and every man living under the Stars and Stripes is invited and should take a part in the full spirit of participation. The adopted citizen is just as welcome, for he is from where he may be as proud of his adopted flag as the native born. No lines are drawn on citizens. The flag is for all. The date of its birth is cherishing by all. There is no reason why Astoria should not celebrate in a grand style. Who will take up the work?

GETTING OUT OF THE RUT.

For 10 years after the civil war the people of the South remained in the same rut. They worked in the same manner, raised cotton and corn, plowed and hoed with the same kind of crude implements, built the same kind of houses, kept the same kind of stores, sold the same kind of goods, used the same ticket and bought in the same old way, and entertained the same kind of guests. From father to son, and to grandson they followed in the same footsteps and possessed the same ambitions.

An alteration in their work, anything that tended to get out of the rut, seemed like foolishness to them. They raised cotton and corn and bought their meat and wearing apparel from the North. The Northern people began to investigate the country. They found that there were openings there for the Northerner. The Northerner went there and raised hogs, and wheat and fine blooded stock and established cotton mills and factories. The Southern people were startled, they thought the new country were fools—the idea of getting out of the rut.

It is the same in newspaper work at a given point. A community gets accustomed to a certain channel and if a paper gets out of it the people are pleased, indignant or suspicious, as the occasion may seem to demand. If they are accustomed to learning from the local columns of the local paper that "Bill Jones was in from St. Louis," or that some one went away on the night train, or that the British bark Aurora sailed from Liverpool, or that the chief of police arrested one "John Doe," they are surprised to see anything else. A real "wonderful" in a living issue is like throwing a stone full of water into an ant bed. But still, after mature consideration they like it. Something new is appreciated by all who think. The unthinking—the people lost in the rut have to be educated up to changes from the old way.

It is the same with preaching. Evangelist Marshall, who began a protracted meeting at the Methodist church Sunday night stepped out of the rut. He suddenly shocked some of the old timers in his audience but he spoke straight from the shoulder and handled things in plain language and without gloves. He did not do it either with a long face nor he laughed while he was doing the "skinning," as he called it.

But contrary to custom—and out of the rut—he did not "skin" what are commonly known as sinners, but he directed his cutting gun on church members. He says he will keep it up all of the week, and that the first night was not a "patchin" to what he will give them.

It may be a long time before some of the "Christians" get accustomed to his manner but the intelligent and the truly converted will finally see the point.
