**COLUMBIA RIVER SALMON.**

The Portland Oregonian has the following to say about Columbia River salmon:

"What is one man's meat is another man's salmon," or something of the sort is illustrated by the effect which the rise in the price of butchers' meat has had on the sale of canned salmon here. Two months ago there was no demand for the large quantity of canned salmon left over from last year's pack on Coast streams and Puget Sound. Now nearly all this salmon has been bought up and is principally in the hands of a few speculators, and orders for canned salmon are coming in from every state in the Union. F. C. Barnes says he has sold 25 carloads of his last season's pack within the past week. The price of canned sockeye salmon has advanced, and orders for future delivery being 2 1/2 cents to 5 cents more per dozen than for delivery at once. One packer of Columbia River salmon, who figures on packing about 25,000 cases this season, has already sold 13,000 cases at a slight decline on the price of last season, but he only pays 5 cents for fish this year, while he paid 4 cents last year. The high price of meat is likely permanently to increase the demand for canned salmon in this country for it finds favor wherever introduced.
