Hon. C. W. Fulton will leave for Portland this morning and will address the people of that city tonight at the closing meeting of the campaign.

F. P. Kendall, formerly local superintendent of the local can factory, but now general manager of the Pacific Can Company, for the Pacific coast, is in the city.

A vote was taken on the night train from Portland a few nights ago on the gubernatorial campaign. There were 27 passengers on the train and 26 were for Furnish.

The school children at Melville and Chadwell respectively rendered appropriate and beautiful Memorial day programs last Thursday, the former at 2:30 and the latter at 5 in the evening. At each place Rev. Oscar Ostrom was present and delivered a brief address.

Those who desire a rare political treat would do well to go to Fishers' opera house tonight and hear the Hon. B. F. Mulkey speak on the issues of the campaign. He is said to be one of the best orators in the campaign this year.

Following river forecast was sent out by Edward A. Beals, government forecast official, stationed at Portland, yesterday: The Lower Columbia river will continue steadily rising for the next six or seven days. At Portland a stage of 20 feet will be reached by Saturday afternoon and a stage of 22 feet by next Monday. At The Dalles a stage of 27 feet will be reached Saturday, and probably 40 feet by Sunday.

Gentlemen returning from Seaside last night report a great R-republican rally at the famous summer resort. Messrs. C. W. Fulton, C. J. Curtis and John C. McCue addressed the voters at that place. An excursion was run from Astoria and with the number that went from here and the number that joined at Warrenton, it is said to have been a large crowd. This added to the Seaside citizens made one of the biggest political gatherings at that place during the present campaign. The Republicans say that Seaside is all right.

Musicians' Union, No. 197, of Astoria, held its first regular meeting last afternoon, and besides electing officers transacted considerable other business. The union starts out with 25 members and expects to increase the number to 40 within a week. Astoria is especially favored with skilled musicians, having a larger number than any city of her size on the Pacific coast, and her union will be one of the strongest on the coast. Following officers were duly elected: President, George A. Lewis; vice-president, George Price; secretary-treasurer, B. D. Johnson; sergeant at arms, G. M. Edwards; executive committee, C. C. Mauer, H. L. Fletcher and George M. Edwards. On account of the large amount of business before the meeting, the election of trustees was postponed until the next meeting.

Minister Oberg received two telegrams from Mrs. Lynch, at Hoquiam, Wash., yesterday. The first stated that her son Walter who had been injured while running an engine there was still in an uncertain condition. His leg had been amputated but the physician at St. David's hospital, who had the case in charge, was not satisfied with the prospects of recovery. Later in the evening the second message came, saying that there was no hope for the life of the young man. Mrs. Lynch requested that her husband come to Hoquiam, and Mr. Lynch will leave for that place by this morning's boat.

On Sunday, June 1, the steamer T. J. Potter will make the round trip to Ilwaco, connecting with special train for all North Beach points, Ilwaco to Nahcotta inclusive. Special train will leave Ilwaco dock on arrival of Potter at 9 a. m.; returning will leave stations as follows: Nahcotta, 3:45 p. m.; Breakers, 4:10 p. m.; Long Beach, 4:15 p. m.; Seaview, 4:25 p. m., arriving at Ilwaco dock at 4:45 p. m. to all points including Nahcotta will be \$1.
