nomination. His election will be a good one.

T. S. CORNELIUS.

This is another native Oregonian. Mr. Cornelius the candidate for county assessor was born in Washington County, Oregon, August 12, 1854. He obtained his education in Indiana. He came to Clatsop County 12 years ago and has since resided in the county. He first engaged in business in the employ of Schofield & Hauke, with whom he remained for seven years and afterwards engaged with Ross, Higgins & Co. with whom he still remains. Mr. Cornelius is a good business man and has had a great deal of experience in business transactions of all kinds. He lived on a farm for a long time and still owns a farm. He is conversant with property values of all kinds and will make the county a good assessor. He is married and has three children living. His selection by the Republicans was a good one.

R. C. P. ASTBURY.

One of the first recommendations of Mr. Astbury for the office of county surveyor is his qualifications for the office. He has had splendid training and an abundance of local experience that makes him the best qualified man for the position in the county. One of the greatest achievements in civil engineering in Clatsop County was made by Mr. Astbury. In surveying out the famous road No. 77 it was thought to be a practical impossibility and that it would require seven months' work at least. Mr. Astbury completed the work in two months. Clatsop County has been grateful to him ever since. He is a native of England and came to America in 1834. He came to Clatsop County in 1835 and has resided here since that time. He has been engaged in surveying ever since. He is now filling out his second term as county surveyor having been appointed to fill out an unexpired term and was subsequently elected to another term. His fitness for the position and popularity is such that the opponent nominated by the mongrels declined to run against Mr. Astbury.

W. C. A. POHL.

He is the coroner. He will be the next coroner. Billie Pohl is so popular that both parties nominated him. He has no opposition and could not be defeated. He is a native of Holstein, Germany. He was born in 1852 and came to Clatsop County in 1874. He received his education in Astoria. He engaged in the undertaking business in 1890 and has since continued in the business. He has been elected for the past five consecutive terms to the office and is thoroughly conversant with the business. He was married in 1885 to Miss Ida M. Washburn and as an issue of the marriage they have four children. If all of the candidates were as safe as he the election tomorrow would cause but little excitement.

C. E. FOSTER.

He is the candidate for road supervisor. He is another native of the state. He was born in Portland in 1859 and came to Astoria in 1877. He was chief engineer of the volunteer fire department for two terms and was elected road supervisor two years ago. He has made a good one and is very popular and will be re-elected. He is also one of the most popular fraternal order men of the city. He is deservedly popular.

P. J. GOODMAN.

He is the justice of the peace and will be re-elected. He has lived in the town for 25 years, everybody knows him, and to know him is to like him. He has reared an interesting family here and all of them stand high. Mr. Goodman has made a good justice of the peace and there is no good excuse for not re-electing him. He is always fair and deals in justice and law combined.

WILLIAM BEASLEY.

He is the nominee for constable. He is a native of Indiana. Was born in 1842 and came to Astoria in 1879. He served four years as constable in Astoria and served eight years as a police officer. He is a carpenter by trade. Mr. Beasley's thorough experience qualifies him for the office. While Republicans are carrying Clatsop County they should not forget to carry their precinct offices by just the same majority.
