VISIT FROM COMMERCIAL MEN.

About Four Hundred of Them Will Spend Two Hours in Astoria Today.

Members of the T. P. A., to the number of about 400 are expected to arrive in Astoria shortly before noon today. Ample arrangements have been made to receive them. The committee having the matter in charge was busy all day yesterday making preparations for the entertainment. The old regatta building on Bond street has been decorated and ornamented inside until it looks as if King Edward's coronation would take place in Astoria. The walls and ceiling and pillars are covered with flowers and evergreens. Tables and benches and chairs have been arranged to seat and serve about 400 persons. The building will be used as a banquet room.

The triumphal arch erected in honor of the members of the G. A. R. has been remodeled and it is now ready to do honor to the members of the T. P. A. Instead of the letters G. A. R. and W. R. C., etc., the shield and initials of the T. P. A. are now ornament the arch. Business men who have their buildings decorated are also requested to let the decorations remain during the stay of the visitors, and the bags are requested to be permitted to remain flying. It is expected to give the visitors a grand reception and entertain them royally while they are here, and as they will only remain in Astoria two hours it will be a busy time.

The committee which has the matter in charge, consisting of Mayor Spreeman, Herman Prall, G. C. Fulton, E. W. Tallant, W. C. Chatter, Chas. V. Brown, F. L. Parker, Walter L. Robb, F. J. Carney and Will Madison, will meet the train at the depot and board the train which will continue to Sanborn's cannery. Here they will leave the train and meet the Eagle Military Band, which will play some choice selections. They will be escorted through the cannery and shown all of the minute details of a first-class cannery in operation and at the same time will be presented with a unique souvenir. Preparations have been made here also for a hearty lunch and refreshments.

Having seen the cannery they will then march in a body to the city, led by the Eagle Military Band. The line of march will be up Bond street, and thence along Eighth to Commercial and along and under the triumphal arch at the Astorian corner and continuing to Eleventh street and north along Eleventh street to Bond and to the old regatta building next door to Wells Fargo & Co., where the banquet will be awaiting them.

The banquet is to consist of clams, cracked crabs, crab salad, baked salmon and coffee. And the greatest part of the banquet will be that 50 of Astoria's fairest women will act as waitresses.

While no speeches had been arranged for last evening, it is presumed that a welcome address will be made and there will be a response, and that there will be a number of short toasts. As soon as the banquet is over the visitors will take their train for Seaside and will return here Friday later.
