Choir boys of the Church of the Redeemer, Pendleton, Oregon, who are on their way to the coast for a vacation, will play a game of baseball this morning at 9 o'clock, with the choir boys of Grace church on Van Dusen field.

E. A. Churchill, aged 30 years, died at St. Mary's hospital Sunday night, after a short illness from lung trouble. The deceased formerly resided at Condon, this state, where he was a member of the Masonic lodge. Local Masons will take charge of the remains.

The lighthouse tender Manzanita will leave out this afternoon for a five week's Alaskan cruise. Yesterday Captain Gregory started North, but when off the heads was signaled by the lightship. Some of that vessel's machinery was in need of repair and the tender brought the gear back to port. Before departing the Manzanita will take on 20 tons of coal at the Elmore bunkers.

Three lumber cargoes, aggregating more than 11,500,000 feet, were cleared at the Astoria customs house yesterday. The barkentine Tam O'Shanter, from Knappa to San Francisco, takes 600,000 feet; the steamer Prentiss, from Hoffman's Landing for San Pedro, has 200,000 feet of lumber and 600 cedar poles, while the schooner Alcide, from Portland for San Francisco, takes 700,000 feet of lumber. The Prentiss and Alcide left out during the day. The schooner John A., with a cargo of lumber, arrived down and is ready for sea.

It is quite possible that some of the river steamers will be forced to tie up tomorrow, because of low water engineers and crews, says last night's Telegram. The marine engineers and deckhands some time ago notified their employers that a 10 per cent advance in wages is expected July 1, and unless their notice be complied with it is to be supposed that the engineers will quit work, and the deckhands go on a strike. It is understood that Jacob Kamm has agreed to raise the wages of his deckhands and that a raise in wages all around has been made on the steamer Spencer, operated by the Shaver Transportation Company.

John Deuch, the 9-year-old son of Peter Deuch, met with a serious accident near his home in West Astoria last night about 7 o'clock. With a companion, the Deuch boy was learning to ride a bicycle. Part of the railing is gone from the roadway and through this the amateur cyclist fell to the rocks below, a distance of 15 feet, suffering a fracture of the left thigh six inches below the joint. Little Johnny's companion neglected to acquaint his friends with the accident, but the injured boy managed to drag himself to a point where he could make himself heard. Dr. Bates was summoned and reduced the fracture, which is a very serious one. The accident occurred near the Seaside cannery.

The has been a revival in bowling at the Commercial alleys of late and some more local tournaments will probably soon take place. It is now the intention to go about the formation of a championship team to take part in the state contests next fall. The system to be adopted will make it necessary for bowlers to earn places on the first team, and the representative six will be re-arranged monthly. With this end in view, a special team will bowl against the men who recently bowled in Portland. The fall games will be of more than ordinary interest here, as the Irving Club is to come into the association, it is said, and enter a team.

The case of Sarah H. Grimes vs. C. C. and G. M. Grimes was reopened in the circuit court yesterday. The suit is one inequity and involves title to land at Seaside. It was tried out previously and thought then to have been settled, but the description of the property did not properly take in the portions legally settled upon the parties to the suit and the case is now up again. The case of Ferguson & Houston vs. George Kaboth will be tried today. The defendant bought in at a delinquent tax sale the lot at the southwest corner of Duane and Eleventh streets. The plaintiffs had previously purchased it from an original owner, and now bring suit to secure title to the lot. The outcome of the suit is awaited with interest, as it involves the legality of the sales for delinquent taxes recently made by the county.

Fred Smith, a Portland young man, had matters all his own way in the Waldorf, an Astor-street resort, Sunday night, when he waved a pistol in a threatening manner and frightened the employees. Smith was arrested by Officer Thompson and appeared before Police Judge Nelson yesterday afternoon to answer to the charge against him. He pleaded guilty of displaying the weapon, but said he had done so in self-defense. According to his story, two men in the Waldorf had assaulted him and the demonstration with the gun followed. Smith had been up in the police court before, and as he has been a source of considerable trouble to the police, he was taxed \$10. He will be kept in jail for a few days and then, if he manifests a disposition to take up his residence elsewhere, will be permitted to leave the city. Charles Conrad and August Kaerla, arrested for drunkenness, were fined \$5 each.

The receipts of salmon at the canneries and cold-storage yards yesterday showed some increase as compared with Saturday's supply. Most of the fish were large and of the regular June run, the arrival of which had been delayed. The tally sheets at the canneries showed that most of the boats returned with twice the amount of larger fish that had heretofore been taken, while the traps also caught more large than small fish. The gill-nets fared very well. One boat brought nine fish weighing 370 pounds, to the Kinney cannery. Five cents a pound is being paid for salmon less than 25 pounds in weight, while fish weighing over 25 pounds bring six cents a pound. The fishermen may realize on their investment, the catches of the small mesh nets being lighter. Never were finer fish packed than those now being taken, and in this respect at least the season will be a success. The seiners complain of high water and poor catches.

The plumbers of the city will not show up for work this morning. The union recently notified the employers that, beginning July 1, the journeymen would expect an increase of 50 cents a day in their wages, and a reduced working day of eight hours. Heretofore the men have been paid \$3 for a nine-hour day. The Master Plumbers' Association, embracing the employers, objected to some of the terms of the demand, and so notified the men. An agreement has not been reached and the plumbers are on strike. One of the employers said last night that he was not opposed to the eight-hour feature of the demand, nor to the demand for \$3.50 a day; but he is opposed to the action of the union in demanding that all journeymen shall receive \$3.50, for the reason that some of the men are not worth that wage. He believes the men should be placed in classes. Fortunately, there are only eight or ten plumbers in the city and the strike will not be a serious one, though it may delay work. It is pretty generally agreed that the differences between employers and employees will be settled, but on what basis cannot be stated.

The excursion given by the Eagles to Cathlamet on Sunday was even more of a success than had been anticipated. There were almost 400 excursionists on the steamer Hassalo when she left her dock at 3 o'clock, and before Cathlamet was reached the crowd was augmented by pleasure-seekers at Skomakawa. The Eagle Military Band furnished the finest music ever heard on the Lower Columbia, and the trip up was a most enjoyable one. Cathlamet was at the wharf to greet the Astorians, and the town had donned holiday attire, the stores being decorated with evergreens and flags, and four pretty arches having been erected. As per arrangement the town was turned over to the visitors, and the home people did everything in their power to make the visit a pleasant one. That they succeeded is apparent from the flattering statements of the excursionists, who

were, figuratively, tickled to death at the treatment accorded them. The feature of the program of sports was the baseball game, during the course of which the band played several selections. The game looked like a walkover for the home aggregation for a few innings, but the percentage of efficiency soon began to operate in favor of the Eagles and they won out. During the afternoon the crowd assembled at the dancing pavilion, where an orchestra of 18 pieces furnished music. The dance was very much enjoyed. The Hassalo reached the city on her return at 5 o'clock. The Eagles are particularly loud in their praise of the kindly efforts made in their behalf by Captain Sullivan, of the Hassalo, and his efficient crew.
