

CONSPIRACY AGAINST CEUSTAS.
Plot Has Been Discovered in a Curious Manner.

NEW YORK, July 2.—A conspiracy against the life of the president of Uruguay, Dr. Ceustas, has been discovered here in a curious manner, says a Herald special from Buenos Ayres. Carlos Paganini was found dead in the streets of this city. The police were investigating the case when they received a communication saying that Paganini was the chief conspirator against the life of Ceustas. The communication further stated that the

police would find in Paganini's dwelling 25 kilos of dynamite. This statement proved true. It is understood that Paganini backed out at the last moment in the conspiracy to assassinate President Ceustas and that one of his fellow conspirators killed him to prevent an exposure of the plot.

DISCOVER PETRIFIED SHIP.

Indians Believe the Ship to Have Been Noah's Ark.

TACOMA, July 2.—W. A. Reid, secretary of the Skagway Y. M. C. A., has returned from the Alaska interior, where he talked with the Indians, whose earnest statements, he believes, fully confirm previous reports that the Indians of the lower Yukon have discovered an immense petrified ship on Porcupine river near the Arctic circle and north of Rampart, Alaska.

When asked regarding its size the Indians traced its dimensions on the ground, indicating a length of 1200 feet. Such Indians as are familiar with the Bible are convinced that the ship is none other than Noah's Ark. Reid intends to return to the interior of Alaska this summer, when he will take some Indians and request army officers to detail soldiers to accompany him. The ship lies on a high hill thousands of feet above the sea level.

COMMITTED TO ASYLUM.

Demented Woman Found at El Paso Ordered Confined.

EL PASO, Tex., July 2.—County Judge Harper has ordered the sheriff to convey Miss Ada Barker to the state insane asylum at Terrell, where she will be confined. Several weeks ago, Miss Barker was found wandering the streets in a demented condition and it is thought she arrived here on a westbound Southern Pacific train. Where she came from or where she is going is a mystery.

NO LIGHT ON HER DEATH.

CHICAGO, July 2.—The exact cause of the death of Miss M. Hannah May Thompson, who died at a boarding house on May 29, last, while wearing a beauty mask, probably will never be known. After hearing evidence on the case, the grand jury has refused to indict "Expert" E. Wesley Johnson, who was administering the facial treatment to Miss Thompson and who had been held on the charge of murder. Johnson, who was arrested with his wife, is still locked up in jail. When the jury's report is made in court today there will be nothing to bar his release.

WILL OF COPPER MAGNATE.

Allows His Children to Make Charitable Bequests.

NEW YORK, July 2.—"Having during my life given largely of my means to deserving charities, I make no charitable bequests, leaving it to my children to make such gifts out of the estate which they receive under my will as they shall deem proper."

In this paragraph of his will, Leonard Levinson, the copper magnate of this city, who died in London on the 5th of March last, left it to the discretion of his nine children as to what sum should be placed aside from his estate for charity.

Following the suggestion contained in their father's will, the nine children have agreed to contribute \$100,000 each to charity as a memorial to their father, making a total of \$900,000 to be devoted to charitable purposes. The details of the distribution of the sum are now being considered. It is estimated that the value of Mr. Levinson's estate is between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000.

TWO LARGEST FREIGHTERS.

NEW YORK, July 2.—Westbound lake captains, who have just come here from the St. Lawrence and put into Charlotte for coal, report, says a Rochester dispatch to the Tribune, that the aft section of the big ocean liner Minnewaska has been warped off the rocks in the St. Lawrence river,

where it struck two weeks ago. Two of the two halves of a sister ship, the Minnesota, were conducted through the perilous waters of lower Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence in safety, and reached Quebec without a mishap.

This news marks the practical completion of one of the most remarkable features of shipbuilding ever known on the Great Lakes. These two huge going freighters were built at Cleveland. Each of them is 500 feet in length. Close calculation showed that the length of the completed vessels would not admit of their passage of the locks in the Welland and St. Lawrence canal by several feet. Consequently it was decided to tow them down the lakes in sections, two to each ship.

AMERICANS LEAVE LONDON.

Coronation Visitors Go to Paris and Elsewhere on Continent.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The end of the present week will witness the exit of a great many Americans from London, cables the correspondent there of the Herald. The boats that sail next Saturday have large passenger lists. Of those who came here especially for the coronation, many already have left for Paris and other parts of the continent. A sort of dullness seems to have settled over everything.
