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DEATH WAS PREFERABLE

FEARED BECOMING A PAUPER AFTER ACCIDENT.

Was an Unsuccessful Candidate for Governor in Arkansas in 1870.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 5.—Colonel J. N. Smith, of Denver, was found dead in his room this afternoon. A pistol clamped in his right hand and a bullet hole through his head, explained the manner of his death. A note nearby gave this further explanation:

"For cripples, paupers and mendicants I have no use; fearing I may get in one of these classes by reason of an injury by which I was recently visited, I end doubt."

While in New York several months ago, Colonel Smith severely injured his ankle by a fall. In 1874 he was an unsuccessful candidate for governor of Arkansas.

KING SIGNS APPOINTMENT.

LONDON, July 5.—King Edward has signed the appointment of Lord Salisbury's principal private secretary, Schomburgk McDonnell, to succeed Lord Escher, who retires from the secretaryship of his majesty's office of works. The Times in an editorial article on this matter says it thinks it doubtful if Lord Salisbury will try to find a new secretary and that the appointment of Mr. McDonnell cannot fail to revive the rumors of premier's resignation after the coronation.

HAYTIENS FLEE TO JAMAICA.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 5.—The Dutch schooner Rigolette has arrived here from the island of Curacao, bringing 34 Haytiens, who were compelled to fly to Curacao on account of the recent fighting in Hayti. M. Jeannis, the late governor of Jacmel, is among them. He says the situation was extremely serious at the time he and his companions fled.

REPORT OF FAILURE DENIED.

PARIS, July 5.—A director of the Belgian bank referred to by the Daily Chronicle of London as having failed for £10,000,000 as the result of advances made to the Humberts, who are now fugitives from justice on account of their alleged swindling operations, denies the report of the failure and says the bank was not connected with the Humbert loans.

LOOKING FOR THIEVES.

NEW YORK, July 5.—Brooklyn police who have been attempting to run down a gang of thieves, operating on an extensive scale in apartment buildings recently, have arrested two women with property valued at \$500 in their possession. The police believe they are at last on the trail of the gang which has been giving them so much trouble in the past few weeks.

SHIPBUILDING INCREASED.

LONDON, July 5.—The official annual statement of the British shipping just issued shows that more ships were built in Great Britain and more sold to foreigners in the year 1901 than in any previous year and that the total tonnage of the British merchant shipping was 9,524,496 tons or 130,000 more tons above the total of 1900.

TRAINING SHIP OVERDUE.

HONOLULU, July 28, via San Francisco, July 5.—The United States training ship Mohican is 30 days out from Yokohama, on her way here and there is some uneasiness lest she has met with disaster.

TO MARTYRED PRESIDENTS.

NEW YORK, July 5.—A bronze tablet commemorating the three murdered presidents, Lincoln, Garfield and McKinley, has been unveiled at the west side of the Young Men's Christian Association.

RESULT OF CHICAGO FOURTH.

CHICAGO, July 5.—Three persons were killed and more than 100 injured in the celebration of this year's Fourth of July in Chicago. Of all these, the killed received fatal wounds from fire arms, while 22 others were injured by guns and stray bullets.

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
