COMMITTEE UNABLE TO AGREE.

Regulation of Speed of Trains Yet to Be Settled by Council.

Considerable business was transacted at last night's meeting of the council, but the proceedings were not of usual interest. The special committee appointed by Mayor Suprenant to frame an ordinance regulating the speed of trains reported that it had met and conferred, but that it had been unable to reach an agreement. Therefore, it was recommended by the committee that the matter be left with the individual members of the council for settlement at some later date. The committee consisted of Messrs. Trullinger, Brix and Burns and City Attorney A. M. Smith.

A petition was presented by Mrs. L. A. Palmer, asking that the drain on the street in front of her property be removed or repaired, as it had damaged the lot. The matter was referred to the street committee.

A communication calling attention to the unhealthy condition of the lot at the northeast corner of Exchange and Sixteenth streets, was referred to the committee of health and police.

Fulton Bros. presented a communication, tendering \$300 in settlement of the assessment due from G. H. Miner for an improvement on Thirty-fifth street. The matter went to the committee on streets.

Liquor licenses were granted to John Stephenson, John Harry, Swan Wilson Loughery & Martin and Henry Daise.

An ordinance providing for the improvement of Commercial street between Third and Sixth was passed under suspension of the rules. The ordinance amending the measure relating to the construction of sidewalks was also passed. The old law, it seems, provided that it would be unlawful for anyone to obstruct streets or sidewalks after the passage of the bill, which made it impossible for the city to require the removal of obstructing buildings which were erected

before the passage of the measure. The new bill remedies the defect.

Resolutions were adopted as follows: By Mr. Brix—Instructing the auditor to have recorded all deeds from the chief of police to the city for property bought in for delinquent taxes. By Mr. Nordstrom—Directing the surveyor to examine and report the best manner of improving Thirty-fourth street. By Mr. Nordstrom—Instructing the board of assessors to make an assessment of \$4198 to pay for the improvement of Astor street, and an assessment of \$1835.40 to pay for the improvement of Fifteenth street between Commercial and Exchange.

PREPARE FOR VISIT OF KING.

NEW YORK, July 21.—Preparations for the proclamation at Delhi of King Edward as emperor of India are proceeding quietly, cables the London correspondent of the Tribune. The Prince and Princess of Wales will leave England for the East about the end of November. They will disembark at Bombay and proceed by special train direct to the old Mogul capital, where a great durbar will be held on January 1.

OLD SETTLER COMMITS SUICIDE.

KALISPELL, Mont., July 21.—James W. Stahl, one of the oldest settlers of Northern Montana, committed suicide this morning by shooting himself with a rifle. He was blind and in ill health, which is supposed to have affected his mind.

SCHOONER IN SEARCH OF HIDDEN TREASURE.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—The schooner Herman has sailed for the South seas, ostensibly on a pleasure

trip, but in reality, it is said, in search of buried treasure, amounting to \$75,000,000 reported to have been hidden on an island by the mutinous crew of a Japanese ship.

Captain James Brown, a retired mariner of the Atlantic coast, is in command of the Herman and is accompanied by four or five Eastern friends. The little schooner was fitted out at an expense of \$18,000.

NEW YORK, July 21.—For refusing to sell beer early today, George Baker, a saloon keeper on West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, was shot and killed by two men. The murderers went to the side entrance of the saloon. Baker came to the door and upon being asked to open the bar refused. The men fired at him and fled. He died shortly afterward at the hospital.

MACARTHUR TAKES COMMAND.

NEW YORK, July 21.—General Jno. R. Brooke, whose headquarters are on Governor's Island, will be succeeded today in command of the department of the East by General Arthur MacArthur, whose post has hitherto been the department of the Lakes. This change in command is expected to take place at noon.
