BIG LOGGING ENTERPRISE.

Benson Company Will Commence Operations on Clatskanie River.

CLATSKANIE, July 23.—(Special)—S. Benson, president of the Benson Logging Company, was in Clatskanie today to arrange for a preliminary survey of his new logging railroad. The road will extend up the Clatskanie river and tap 8000 acres of fine timberland, on which there is more than 50,000,000 feet of timber. The logs will be put in the water at the Clatskanie depot. Mr. Benson is now securing the necessary rights-of-way for the road, work on which will shortly be commenced.

lumber to the Northwest Sash & Door Company.

The new flume of the West Oregon Lumber Company is now completed. The planing machinery is being installed in the old Bryant mill and the plant will soon be ready for operations.

WAR AMONG FISHERMEN.

WHATCOM, Wash., July 23.—War has broken out between the Puget Sound gillnet fishermen. The fishermen have commenced going into the traps and fishing and the trap-owners have had a number of them arrested for attempted grand larceny. The fishermen declare that the presence of the traps in Puget Sound waters is contrary to the federal laws and consequently they violate no law in going to them and fishing.

DIFFERS AS TO OPINION.

DENVER, July 23.—Resolutions have been unanimously adopted by the Catholic clergy of Denver diocese, assembled in their annual retreat, which take views of the school question and the Friar question in the Philippines differing from those recently expressed by Archbishop Ireland. They protest against the forcible of the Friars as a violation of the constitution.

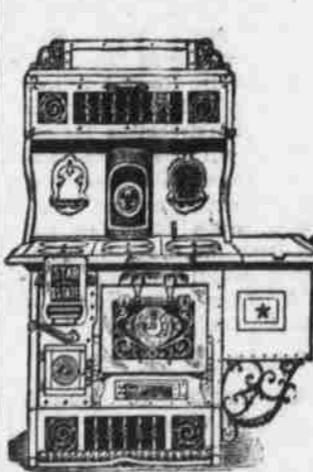
