TEXAS RAINS HAVE CEASED.

Prospects Look Bright and if Fair Weather Continues Bellroads Will Run on Time.

DALLIAS, Tex., July 28.-During the last 24 hours the aspect of the flood situation in Texas has grown brighter. The heavy rains have ceased throughout the greater portion of the state and the water has begun to recede in all the rivers and creeks. If the fair weather continues some of the Texas railroads will begin running their trains on time today, while regular traffic will be re-established on others within three or four days. The Cotton Belt tracks are washed out for 260 feet just west of Brandon. The Missouri, Kansas & Texas bridge at Hillsbore has been repaired and trains were run over it yesterday, although the track is still in bad condition,

The International & Great Northern has resumed traffic north of Palestine The damage done to the property of that road is said to be very great. Nearly 1000 feet of the track is washed out at Richard creek, and as much more at White Rock creek, besides many smaller washouts.

Dallas was visited by another heavy downpour yesterday. Trinity river is considerably over its banks in many places, but little damage is reported

Texas & Pacific railroad officials state that the situation at Big Springs is much improved and unless there is much more rain they expect to resume operations today or tomorrow. A Mr. Hardy, who attempted to cross a swollen stream at Elms Springs, was drowned. This makes five drownings which have been reported as a result of floods.

SCARCITY OF LABOR IS FELT.

Run of Fish Cannot Well Be Handled by the Packers.

"If there were 500 more available Chinamen in Astoria, we'd show you how to pack salmon!" exclaimed a canneryman yesterday to an Asterian man, when the reporter remarked that fish seemed to be rather plentiful. We're short of help and in much worse shape than last year. Our pack from this time will not be nearly as large as it was in 1901, but we will prob-

ably reach the 250,000 mark if the

apply of fish holds out." Yesterday's receipts of salmon were gain heavy, although reports were that the run had fallen off nearly onehalf from the lower river stations However, all the canneries had as much fish as could be handled, and for about the first time the scarcity of Chinese labor was seriously felt. The difference between the pack of

this year and that of last year, if there should be any difference, has already materialized. Up to July 29 of ast year the fish were very scarce, and the pack on that date was almost a failure. Then the big run set in, and until the close of the season the canneries were blocked. As the canners had more help then than now, the pack from July 20 to August 15, 1901, was greater than will be the case for the same period this year. The packers have made a material gain up to July 20 this year, but from this time on that gain will be reduced. If the total pack on the Columbia is 250,-000 cases, the canners will be very well satisfied. It is just possible it may slightly exceed these figures, but not

naterially. The increase in the run of fish has rought about a drop in the price, and ow all the canners are paying 4 cents pound. The gillnetters have been fimited to 400 pounds to the boat. The reduction in the price went into ef-

fect Sunday night. Only two cold-storage concerns are now being operated-Schmidt Bros.' and Lindenberger's. M. Booth is still operating at Megler's, but his cutput will probably not exceed 190 tierces. Schmidt and Lindenberger are not perating on an extensive scale.


