The steamer Aberdeen arrived down the river yesterday from Westport and cleared for Redondo, Cal., with a lumber cargo. She takes 20,000 feet of lumber and 1070 cedar poles.

The British bark Wynford arrived down the river yesterday, and will proceed to sea as soon as she gets a crew. She goes to Port Elizabeth, South Africa and takes 125,444 bushels of wheat, valued at \$34,078.

County Treasurer Heilborn yesterday issued a call for all warrants drawn on the general fund and endorsed prior to March 23, 1901, and May 1, 1901. The amount of the principal is \$2671.73, and of the interest \$291.34.

The schooner John A. Campbell is loading at Ranier. She will take on 400,000 feet of lumber and 300,000 feet of piles for San Pedro. The Repeat is loading 500,000 feet of lumber for San Francisco. The schooner Lizale Vance has completed a cargo of 550,000 feet of lumber at Portland.

"Big" John Mattison, a well known fisherman, says this is the most peculiar fishing season he has experienced for some years. "One day the fish are up river and the next day they are at the bar," says Mattison. "Perhaps it's me, however, for I am getting old. Anyway, I can't catch fish like I used to."

Andrew L. Mattison, who recently attempted suicide, was out yesterday for the first time, and visited the Elmore cannery. He said he was unable to explain his rash act, and is very happy the attempt proved futile. Mattison thinks there's nobody on earth like Dr. Pilkington, who pulled him through his trouble.

The new Washington pilot schooner Thomas F. Bayard is due tomorrow. It is understood she will be on her way to commission. After her arrival here the Oregon pilots will make a definite announcement as to the proposed increase in pilotage rate. It is the intention to adopt the Washington scale of rates, which is 40 per cent in excess of that heretofore in effect at the mouth of the Columbia river.

The school directors yesterday paid an official visit to McClure school for the purpose of inspecting that structure. The building is situated on sliding ground, and there has been some fear that it was not as safe as it should be. The directors' investigation satisfied them that the schoolhouse was not unsafe, but they will have an expert examine it and make a report. Repairs to the building have been contemplated, but nothing definite has been decided upon.

There was a big slump yesterday in the run of fish and receipts were very light at all the packing houses. The Packers reported the run to be smaller than for several weeks past. The Jim Crow sands sent down only two and one-half tons, whereas this ground' catch the previous day was 10 tons. The Desdamona sands alone reported good hauls. According to reports received last evening from the Heads a new run of fish is coming in to the river, and it is believed the slump is only temporary.

Tomorrow is the date set for the big industrial excursion to Seaside, and he is indeed a lobster who neglects to provide himself with the necessary ticket. Everybody is going along, and, as the weather will be fine, the day promises to be a most enjoyable one. The excursion train will be arranged for the special convenience of the excursionists and there will be plenty of seats for all. The train leaves the depot at 9 o'clock, and intending excursionists are warned to be on hand before that hour. Persons who have not yet secured tickets may do so by calling on members of the Industrial committee. Returning, the train leaves Seaside at 4:45.

Boat No. 27, fishing for the Packers was capsized yesterday near the bell buoy at Sand Island. The boat was manned by John Jacobson and his boatpinner, who clung to the bottom of the overturned craft until aiders went to their rescue. The schooner Elena recovered the net. When word was received at the Elmore cannery, the launch Rover was dispatched to the scene, and men, boat and gear were brought to the city. Apart from their ducking, the fishermen were none the worse or the unpleasant experience. The men are fishing again today.

Jess Cheshire and Al Abel yesterday submitted themselves to the folly of touching a match to powder, and it is safe to predict they will never repeat the performance. The powder was found in the Waldorf yesterday and had been used to doctor sick dogs. Cheshire suggested that it would explode nicely if scattered along the street, and the suggestion was acted upon. The powder did not explode readily and both men walked over to it to again prepare the fuse. They were looking at the powder when it suddenly exploded. Cheshire was burned about the head, suffering pain-

ful injuries. Ated had his mouth open when the explosion occurred and breathed some of the fire. He was removed to St. Mary's hospital, and was getting along nicely last night. Cheshire will be out in a few days.

The month just passed was thought to have been a very dry one, but Weather Observer Johnson's records show that it was wetter and colder than is usually the case in July. The average temperature for month was 60.3, or 1 degree below normal. The highest mark reached officially by the glass was 82, on the 18th, while the lowest point reached was 47, on the 21. The total rainfall for the month was 2.59 inches, or 1.78 inches in excess of the average for July, which is 1.11. The excess in precipitation was due to a storm that prevailed on the night of the 14th, when 1.12 inches of rain fell. There was some rain for the first two days of the month, but the weather was, on the whole, delightful. Rain fell on 19 days, while 12 were clear, 11 partly cloudy and eight cloudy. The total precipitation since September 1 has been 82.65 inches, showing an excess to date of 7.19 inches.

### THE CUBAN REPUBLIC.
