FISHERMAN RUN DOWN BY STEAMER POTTER

Nineteen-Year-Old Boat Puller Is Drowned—Responsibility Not Yet Placed.

Last Sunday evening, while returning from North Beach, the T. J. Potter ran into a fish boat and the boat puller, Henry Hemi, was drowned. The steamer's search light was not in working order, and the fishing boat did not carry any lights, so the steamer was almost onto the fishermen before it was sighted. It seems that the fishermen, John Wilson and Henry Hemi, were hauling in their net; they had one-half of it in the boat before they saw the steamer, one of the Potter's wheels caught the other part of the net and it was quickly wound around the wheels and drawing the boat in toward it. When Wilson and Hemi saw this danger they jumped from their boat, Hemi jumping first. At the moment, the Potter was stopped, so the boat was not damaged to any great extent. It was picked up by the Potter, and brought to the city.

When seen by an Astorian reporter yesterday afternoon, Wilson was bailing the water out of his unlucky boat. He had a severe cut on the back of his neck, which he received while swimming after jumping from his boat. Besides the loss of his friend and boat puller, Wilson lost a new net that cost him \$200 and the boat's oars and sail. He was feeling pretty blue. He did not understand how his young partner was killed, as Hemi was the first into the water and therefore farther away from the Potter's wheel.

As soon as the cries for help were heard, life preservers were thrown in the direction from which the cries came. The Potter sailed around, found the fishing boat, and latter picked up Wilson. Just before Wilson was rescued, young Hemi was heard to call out some Finnish words. This is the last heard of the nineteen year old boatpuller who so recently came to Astoria from his native land. Up to a late hour last night the body had not been recovered.

Captain Turner, of the Potter, states that it was impossible to see the fishers at all, since it did not carry a light. John Wilson says that he saw the steamer coming, and had pulled out of her course, but suddenly she shifted and came tearing down toward him. Then it was that Hemi jumped, and Wilson, seeing the great danger, followed. Owing to the darkness they were unable to keep near each other. The responsibility for the accident has not yet been placed. When the body of Henry Hemi is recovered an inquest will be held. If this inquest is ever held, the Fishermen's Union will make itself known.
