The price of wood keeps advancing slowly, but with a steady movement. And it is hard to obtain, owing to the fact that good choppers are hard to obtain. Sunday, the Astoria & Columbia River railway began to use coal for their engines instead of the popular Oregon fir. Next they may have our trains pulled by oil burners.

The salmon catch during the last 35 hours has been somewhat disappointing from the fact that the heavy run which has been expected to rule during the last fortnight of the fishing season has not yet materialized. While certain fortunate or unusually skillful men have reported from 1000 to 1500 pounds each, the catch is described as averaging light. The universal prayer is for a steady run during the remaining nine days of the open season.
