THE ASTORIA SPIRIT.

The following editorial utterance appeared Tuesday night in the Portland Evening Telegram:

Astoria and Clatsop county are sharing in the general awakening of the state to its opportunities and advantages. The City by the Sea has two or more organizations of business men and property holders that are working steadily and successfully to develop new industries and increase the business of that already thriving city and encourage investment and settlement in the sparsely inhabited, forest-clad County of Clatsop. That county is vast and rich in timber, and is not without other valuable features, and will gradually fill up during a century to come, so that its progress will be steady and long continued, if comparatively slow.

Astoria, already, according to the census of 1900, the second city in point of population in the state, will also grow steadily in size of importance, even if Portland does remain the principal seaport as well as the commercial center of the Columbia river region. There is room for both, and there need be no jealousy or friction between them. We are going to have a channel to the sea sufficient to accommodate all but the very largest ocean carriers, such as J. J. Hill is building, which, after all, are liable to be financial failures; but that is no reason for Astoria to entertain a grievance. In fact, it is but a comparatively few of her citizens who protest against the improvement by deepening the channel between the two cities. Most of them are liberal, progressive people, and judging from recent industries established or in contemplation there, they are more awake than ever before to their opportunities, and to the bright future before their city, if they keep pushing and pulling together for a big, good town down by the sounding sea.

The Telegram need have no fear that there will be any hostility on the part of the people of this city towards the project looking to the betterment of the channel from Portland to the sea. Astoria thoroughly appreciates that there is room for Portland on the Oregon map, and, if that city can help herself by securing a better waterway, Astoria will join in the general rejoicing.

This is not to say, however, that the common point idea is dead. Astoria has always maintained, and will continue to maintain, that the granting of terminal grain rates to this port will do more than anything else to build up Oregon, and particularly the Island Empire. But it is also awake to the fact that agitation looking to securing such rates would now be futile, owing to the merging of railroad interests, and must therefore rest content in the hope that the great carriers will of their own accord recognize the advantages of the real ocean port and thereby add annually a few million dollars to the wealth of the producers. It will

be recalled by the Telegram that Astoria has always been very fair in her demands, asking only that she be placed on the same footing as Seattle and Tacoma, inferior ports, whereas a demand for equal rates with Portland would not, under the railroad common-point rule, be at all unreasonable.

Lest the present status may be continued for an indefinite period, however, Astoria has gone about the development of local resources, and in the first seven months of the present year has succeeded in securing enterprises that will sustain an additional population of 2000 or more. In lieu of common rates, new mills and factories will do very well, and there is to be no let-up in the elaborate plan to make Astoria greater.

Perhaps the time will soon again come when the demand for common rates can be opportunely renewed; and when that time arrives Astoria will be ready with the array of facts and figures that a few years ago caused the Portland papers so much concern.

Nevertheless, be it remembered that any rate on grain from the Columbia to tidewater which enables it to be hauled over the longer route and the mountain grades to Puget Sound is an excessive and unreasonable rate. The demand of the farmers should be fixed upon a rate based upon the shortest haul over the easiest grades—Oregonian.

Except, of course, when Portland happens to be at the long end.

Presidents Mellen, Hill and Mohler have discovered a wheat pool that robs the farmers. It seems to us we, too, once heard some rumor regarding this pool.
