WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The United States and Haytian Telegraph & Cable Company has appealed to the state and navy departments to prevent the cutting of the cable at Cape Haytian by the revolutionists.

FERRYBOAT NEW BRUNSWICK—WICK BURNED.

Caused by Overturning a Lamp in the Engine Room.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—An overturned lamp in the engine room of the ferryboat New Brunswick, plying between New Brunswick, N. J., and New York, set fire to the boat and so rapidly did the flames spread that this vessel had to be beached on the Meadows, about three miles below New Brunswick, and allowed to burn to the water's edge.

Captain George F. Rogers, of Brooklyn, gave orders that the life boats should be lowered when it became apparent that they could not successfully be fought and the passengers were taken ashore so speedily that there was no excitement. The engineer of the boat, William Traver, of Bath, N. Y., was badly burned about the face and hands.

Two race horses were pushed overboard and swam ashore uninjured. The vessel was valued at \$50,000; partially insured.
