

BOY EMULATES TRACY

AFTER BEING WOUNDED HE KILLS HIMSELF

Companion Surrenders to posse - Committed Several Bold Highway Robberies.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Aug. 9.—A series of daring highway robberies which resulted in the death of one of the robbers occurred on the Montreal road this evening.

Two young men, apparently little more than boys in age, held up and robbed a dozen different men, until overtaken by a posse near Gilroy. A running fight ensued and one of the robbers was shot through the stomach. Emulating the convict Tracy, he blew out his own brains. The other man surrendered.

NATIVES ARE DESTITUTE.

Unable to Plant New Crop and All Old One Has Been Destroyed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Major B. K. West, of the commissary department, writing from Manila to General Weston, chief commissary, has the following to say concerning the feeling of natives in the Philippines:

"I was in hopes that the closing up of the campaign in Batangas and Laguna would end the feeling of the natives but such is not the case, although the camps have been broken up. The natives were left in a destitute condition; had been unable to plant new crops; all the old crops had been destroyed in the military operations and so the work has to go on. General Bell was in the city and I asked him about the number of natives he was feeding. He told me that in Batangas he was feeding approximately 250,000 people. In Laguna he could not tell the exact number but I judge from the quantity that we supply that there must be about half as many."

BODY IDENTIFIED AS THE AIRSHIP INVENTOR.

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—It is believed the body of the man found drowned in the Sound near Mamaroneck Thursday with a hatchel containing machinists' tools tied around the neck was that of Hugo Ringwold, of this city. Ringwold, who was a machinist, was highly educated and spoke four or five languages. As an inventor he had perfected plans for an air ship and had learned the machinists' trade in order that he might build the craft. His employer had Ringwold seemed to be in comfortable circumstances but spoke little of his personal affairs of which nothing is known.

FLY CASTING CONTEST.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—The world's championship fly casting tournament has begun at Stone Lake in Golden Gate park. To Walter D. Mansfield of this city belongs the first honors as he not only won the light rod distance cast but broke the existing world's record of 95 feet, made in 1888 by E. C. Leonard by 2 1/2 feet, getting out his line 129 1/2 feet.
