





#### ADJUSTING RAILROAD RATES.

Commercial:

President Hill of the Great Northern was both lucid and epigrammatic in his talk to the Washington wheatgrowers at the Davanport conference "As well attempt," he said, "to set a broken limb by law as to adjust raffroad rates by statutes. You can legislate until the barn doors rot off. The best thing to do is to act as you have here, with the officials. We will try to act in such a way that you will realize that we are doing something fair and in good faith."

It depends of course, a good deal on the "officials"-and on the shippers, too. If all the rollway executives in the country could uniformly be celled on to be as fair to their patrons as in this particular instance and if all the patrons of the railroads were never more exacting or more unreasonable in their Jeman's and desires than are the farmers of the "Big Bend" country, there would be no need of laws, state or federal, requising the railway traffic of the country. Hat It isn't for that sort of people that the state or the government enacts and enforces laws. If all men were strictly honest, penalties for stealing would he as ridiculous as they would be superfluous. It is for the antitheses of the fair and the honest that railway legislation is necessary.

We quite sgree with Mr. Hill that this sort of legislation has not been pre-eminently successful thus far in accomplishing its purpose, but we cannot share his pessimism as to the autlook for possible improvement. In fact, it is not too much to hope that, within the life-time of a sound barn door hung today, there may be in our statutes something which will exactly fit existing transportation conditions


