WHY THIS DISCRIMINATION?

It was thought that Astoria was in a fair way to get the settlers rates, but the circular issued by the immigration clearing association for New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Baltimore excludes it from the common rate.

Stations in Oregon and Washington east of the Cascade mountains have a rate less than the places west of the mountains. All places west of the mountains on the railroad, from Medford to Victoria, have a common rate except Astoria, which is discriminated against to the amount of one and a half dollars. How is it that a passenger can be carried from Goble to Medford, a distance of three hundred and sixty-eight miles for nothing, but be charged one dollar and a half to Astoria, a distance of sixty miles? Here is a district of nearly four counties, with many acres of fine lands susceptible of furnishing many homes. Do not the great roads see any business in this direction? Does not the local road think it profitable to settle up the vacant lands and build up the business that would thrive here? Perhaps it would be well to ask a conference with the presidents of the roads. It seemed to be effective in cases of the farmers of the Inland Empire?

LABOR AND CAPITAL.

Mark Hanna, at a recent Chautauqua in the East delivered an address on "Labor and Capital." In the course of explaining this wide topic he said: "I know that the tendency in this country and the world over has been to selfishly appropriate the larger part of the benefits of industry to capital. As long as labor was in a situation that it must submit, it did so, but in the twentieth century, when thinking men began to think seriously upon this question, they made up their minds that they must give consideration to the fact that the laboring man is entitled to a greater share of the products of industry which they helped to create."

Coming from a man in Senator Hanna's position, that is a most important declaration, which cannot fail to have a potent effect upon all discussions, disputes and settlements of the future. It is true the speaker went on to defend the trusts as economic necessities, as indeed they are—the natural and inevitable sequence of unlimited destructive competition—yet the proclamation that labor must share with capital a fair proportion of its profits, and that in far too many instances an equitable division has not yet been reached, will help greatly.

to clarify the industrial situation, and ought to make more acceptable to capitalist and employee alike the principle of arbitration, for which the National Civic Federation stands.

WE MUST HAVE SHIPS.

In view of the congressional elections next November we must not neglect to impress on the country, and on all congressional candidates the fact that our merchant marine requires building up by means of protection in the form of a liberal ship subsidy bill. If we get enough more ocean going steamships we can be saved the humiliation (and expense of \$200,000 yearly) of being forced to ask foreigners to carry our goods for us. Our motto should be, "American goods in American made and owned ships, navigated by American officers, and, as far as possible, American seamen."

When the American flag is flying at the masthead of an American vessel in every port and on every sea, interest in both our navies, mercantile and war, will increase.

Our bright capable young men will be attracted to seamanship as a profession, one of the noblest in the world. That is what gave England her centuries of pre-eminence in the world's carrying trade. The chance for the future is ours. Why do we not take it? Why is it that our commissioner of Navigation is compelled to report that the increase in the number of our sea-going officers in the navy is only 53 since 1882, while the tonnage has increased by 582,175 tons? The total tonnage of our navy, authorized, completed, and under construction, is 227,822, and we have only one sea-going officer to every 886 tons displacement. In 1892 we had one officer to each 254 tons.

Seamanship as a profession has not been popular. The passage of a liberal ship subsidy bill will help to make it so.
