The British ships Eskasoni and Sierra Estrella, both loaded, are waiting for a channel to be dug at the mouth of the Willamette, so they can proceed down the river.

The street committee of the city council and the property owners in Alderbrook will meet in the mess house of the old Scandinavian cannery to discuss the proposed grade improvements of Cedar street.

The funeral of the late Warren Mortenson, who was drowned last Monday while in swimming, was held at the family residence yesterday afternoon. Rev. O. E. Haahelm conducted the services.

Michael Sheehan, a seaman, has sued the British ship Eskasoni for \$5000 damages. He claims to have dislocated his shoulder while on duty aboard this ship, and that the captain refused him proper treatment.

Captain J. J. Jacobson, who was murdered on the high seas by his Japanese cabin boy sailed from this port on July 22 for Tsintan, China. He had many warm friends here, who regret his untimely end. He was very popular among all shipping men on the coast.

There was a queer rig in the city yesterday. It was occupied by a party from the Dalles, who were on their way to Seaside. The vehicle was fixed so it could be changed into a small dwelling, a boat or a spring wagon. The top is a skiff, and the bed of the wagon is arranged in a very new style manner. The wagon was designed by C. B. Betts, a member of the party, and cost \$400.

It has been quite a hobby with a great many men here to try and lift the 35-pound stone bicycle racks in front of Will Madison's cigar stores. A suit was filed in the circuit court yesterday afternoon by Chas. Wright, S. E. Harris, P. J. Goodman, Hans Jacobson, John Kopp, Ole Johnson, Mrs. John Palmer, J. J. Utzinger, Neils Simonsen and D. Malagamba, persons owning property abutting on Thirty-fourth street, restraining the city from improving that thoroughfare, a contract for which was let yesterday afternoon. The complaint alleges that the contract let by the street committee to J. A. Fastabend for \$2450 is exorbitant, being 3750 higher than the surveyor's estimate, also that an account of adding ground to the improvement would be a detriment to the property, unless proper drainage is provided for.
