The officers in charge of the local Salvation Army barracks have returned from the hallelujah camp meeting, lately held at Seattle, and report a glorious time. Meetings will be held as usual in future.

The schooners Harvest Home and John A. have completed their lumber cargoes. The Harvest Home goes to Tongue, China, with 815,550 feet of lumber. The John A. goes to San Francisco and takes 325,000 feet.

The German four-masted ship Peter Rickmers reached port yesterday, after a passage of 23 days from Hingo. She comes in ballast and is under charter to load grain. The Rickmers is one of the finest ships that ever made this port and has been here several times.

Within the next few days yellow Crawford (freestone) peaches will begin to arrive from Ashland. Those desiring to can this fruit should leave us their order now, and we will see to it that their orders will be filled with the best fruit at the lowest market price.—Johnson Bros.

The Portland dredge has succeeded in liberating the Euphrosyne and Brambletye from their berths of mud at the mouth of the Willamette, and both vessels have finally reached the metropolis. They were in the mud bank for a week, during which time the dredge was busy digging a channel for them.

Thursday, August 29, will be a big day for organized labor in Astoria. Central Labor Council has made arrangements for the appearance of Mayor Chase, of Haverhill, Mass., who is touring the West. Mr. Chase's subject will be "Organized Capital vs. Organized Labor." He is a noted speaker and his address will be listened to by a large crowd of people.

A new boathouse has been built at the Scandinavian cannery by the docks, in which to house their launches, schooners and small steamers, which are now being taken out of the water for the season. The cannery has been cleaned up and are being filled with fishing boats, which is a pretty good indication that there will be no fall fishing as far as the packers are concerned.

The Northern Pacific yesterday notified its connecting lines that settlers' rates would be extended to Astoria during the months of September and October. This is as it should be, and places Astoria on an equal footing as regards rates from the East during these months. It is apparent that the time must soon come when there will be no discrimination against the seaport of Oregon.

Members of Astoria lodge of Elks are hard at work preparing for their coming visit to the Portland Elks' carnival on September 4, and it is expected that fully 150 will make the trip. A special train has been engaged and a band will accompany the Astorians, who will appear in attractive uniforms. Another effort will be made to capture the prize offered for the biggest turnout.

The work of improving Thirty-fourth street is still going on despite the injunction proceedings commenced by demonstrating property owners. The injunction has been served on Mayor Sprent and Auditor Nelson, but the contractor has not been enjoined and he is at work on the street. The mayor contends that the action of the property owners in serving injunctions on himself and the auditor is of no avail, and that the contractor must be enjoined if the work is to be stopped.

Absolutely nothing has been learned that would tend to establish the identity of the two fishermen who were drowned a few days ago at the mouth of this river. The number of the boat was 131, but the men who took out that number both in 1900 and 1901 are accounted for. It is just possible the number may have been issued before 1900. The boat and net are still at the Cape Disappointment life-saving station, where Captain Stewart will hold them until the names of the unfortunate men are learned.

The schooner Merchant, which went ashore while in tow of the tug Vossburg near the Nahalem bar on August 11, was sold at auction by the underwriters to the Wheeler Lumber Company, who own the cargo of lumber. The price paid was \$15. As vessel is now in several feet of sand and lies in the breakers, she will probably soon be a total loss except the sails and rigging. Her skipper, Captain Matheson, came up overland yesterday on his way home to San Francisco.

Leander Lebeck expects to complete today a large log boom for the O. R. & N. Company at Ilwaco. The boom measures 300 by 500 feet, and is capable of holding four or five million feet of logs. It is the intention to load the logs on special log cars at Nahcotta, where facilities have been arranged for the purpose, whence they will be hauled to Ilwaco and dumped into the log boom for rafting. This will furnish a good market for Shoshwater bay timber, much of which is destined to be cut in future on the Columbia, and probably at Astoria.

The report has been current in Portland for a day or two that the British ship Austrasia had arrived here with cholera aboard. The Portland Journal printed a sensational story about the matter but it was a false alarm. The Austrasia has not made port yet, being in the offing, and, as she has not reported having the plague, it is thought she is free from disease of any kind.

For the Elks' Carnival and Street Fair to be held at Portland from September 1st to 13th, inclusive, the A. & C. R. R. will make a rate of \$2 for the round trip between Astoria and Portland on the following dates: For the evening train of September 23, morning train September 24th, evening train September 25th, all trains of September 26th, and morning train of September 27th. These tickets will be good to return until September 14th.

F. A. Seufert, of The Dalles, complains in the Oregonian that the fishing season on the upper river was a poor one, and attributes the light run at the cascades to the operation of the lower river gillnetters. He thinks the legislature should prohibit fishing "on the bar." There are 14 canneries on the Columbia, two being at the cascades, so, if Mr. Seufert's plan were put into effect, it would be necessary to change the seat of the fishing industry from Astoria to The Dalles. The opinion here is that Mr. Seufert should seek a location on the lower river, as his fish wheels have all along done incalculable injury to the fishing industry.

Monday evening the Elizabeth Hale Company inaugurates a week's season at Fishers' opera house in a repertoire of plays, changed every night. Monday evening the great emotional drama entitled "Won Back" will be produced. From the South Bend Journal the following is taken: The melodrama, "Won Back," drew a large audience to the opera house last night. Miss Hale, the leading lady, is an emotional actress of ability and her portrayal of the character of the wronged woman showed careful study and aptitude. The support was much above the average, and the applause all the members of the company received was well deserved. Seat sale opens tomorrow morning at Griffin & Reed's.

Bank employees say that they have noticed a very peculiar human trait during the past week. Since August 15 the salmon dealers have paid out many thousands of dollars to fishermen and other employees, most of the payments being made by check. As soon as the men received their checks they hastened to the banks to cash them, and go away with bright \$20 gold pieces. In a few days they return and place their money on deposit at the banks, keeping it until the novelty of carry around the gold has worn off. This little incident demonstrates the truth of David Harum's observation—"They's as much human nature in some people as they is in others, if not more."

TO RESTORE THE EARLY RUN.

Efforts of Fish Warden Van Dusen Will Be Bent in That Direction.

Fish Warden Van Dusen is very well pleased with the showing made by the hatcheries during the season just closed on the Columbia river. This season's run demonstrated to the entire satisfaction of all that hatchery work will accomplish wonders, and erstwhile skeptics are now enthusiasts.

The greatest work cut out for the hatcheries is to restore the early run of salmon. These are the fish that make their appearance in the river during April, May and June. They are usually large fellows, weighing 25 pounds, and are of exceptional fine quality, being greatly in demand for pickling purposes. They command the highest prices. Mr. Van Dusen states that he has located his hatcheries with a view to propagating early fish, and he confidently expects that his efforts in this line will prove successful.

Year after year the run of fish has come later into the Columbia, and statistics compiled by the fish warden show the necessity of intelligent action by the state fisheries department. The following statement, taken at random years, shows the percentage of chinook fish taken from the river during the several months of the season:

From this it will be seen that more than half the pack of the first four years mentioned was put up during the early months, while during 1901 only little more than 20 per cent of the pack was early fish. It is believed by hatchery experts that the early supply can be restored to its former proportions by hatching early fish, and the efforts of the fisheries department will be directed toward that end.
