Property owners claim that Exchange street between Seventeenth and Twenty-third is in good condition, excepting for the planking, and are signing a petition to that effect, and at the next meeting of the council will present it to that body.

The Vanguard did not leave up for Cathlamet yesterday until late in the afternoon. The delay was occasioned by some part of the engine getting out of order. The passengers from up the river made good use of their extra time visiting different points of interest about the city.

Those merry parties still continue to regale at the Eleventh street resort because the toothsome delicacies served at the Toke Point Oyster house make it the most popular place in the town. Fresh Toke point oysters and other shell fish always on hand.

The local lodge of Elks expect to have a fine representation at the carnival soon to be held in Portland. For the Elks' Carnival and Street Fair to be held at Portland from September 1st to 13th, inclusive, the A. & C. R. R. will make a rate of 32 for the round trip between Astoria and Portland on the following dates: For the evening train of September 3d, morning train September 4th, evening train September 8th, all trains of September 9th, and morning train of September 10th. These tickets will be good to return until September 14th.

Tonight Herman Wise will royally entertain his customers at a supper and dance at Foard & Stokes' hall. Mr. Wise has very carefully arranged all details and a delightful time is sure to be enjoyed by all who are fortunate enough to be one of his guests.

Captain Tatton, who returned from Wilhoit Springs a few days ago, was followed home by his wife yesterday. The captain left this morning to attend to some repairs to his houseboat in anticipation of its fall use. He goes out on the pilot boat Pullitzer September 1.

The delayed arrival in the city of the evening Seaside train for the past two evenings has made it quite inconvenient for the West Side people who are obliged to return on the 5:50. Less than an hour in which to conduct their business and reach the depot makes them hard pressed for time.

The papers of Baker City are urging the matter of organizing a Push Club in their town either as an auxiliary to the Chamber of Commerce or as an independent organization. The citizens who are interested in the movement state the conditions that demand it and urge that the project be pushed to success.

The O. R. & N. steamer Hassalo will not arrive from Portland at the usual time this morning. After starting on the downward trip one of the shafts broke and the vessel put into shore. It will require some time to remedy the injured machinery, so that the steamer will possibly not reach Astoria until this afternoon.

Chinatown became greatly excited yesterday evening at about 5 o'clock at what they seemed to think as something serious. A blaze in a chimney at the corner of Eighth and Bond streets created the commotion, and as the volume of smoke subsided the Mongolians quieted and dispersed. A great deal of merriment was had from the scene by the white spectators.

Labor day will be celebrated in Astoria by the labor unions. An excursion will be given to Seaside Sunday, August 31. Fare, 15 cents for round trip; children 10 cents. Train leaves depot at 8 o'clock a. m., returning leaves Seaside at 4:40 p. m. All friends of organized labor are cordially invited to attend. This will be the last excursion of the season.

W. J. Honeyman, president of the Knappa coal mine, spent last night in Astoria and leaves this morning for two or three days' rest at the seashore. Mr. Honeyman thinks that the coal strike will have little effect on this coast. In answer to a question, Mr. Honeyman expressed himself as most sanguine for the future of the Knappa Company. "Here we are," said he, "within half a mile of deep water—an ideal spot for a coal mine. At our meeting this week we made arrangements for the disposal of the balance of our stock. We do not intend to bother about the upper seams as in this region the coal is poor at the higher levels. We shall put in holes 1500 feet deep and get after the good material."

The Elizabeth Hale Company played Hazel Kirk last night to a crowded house and gave an exceptionally clever performance of this old time favorite. NORTH STAR ARRIVES.

The Alaska Fishermen's Packing Company's steamer arrived in port this morning, Captain P. F. Crim in command, and Mr. McMillan, engineer. They report head winds for a day or so, and then splendid weather and fair winds all the way down. North of Grays Harbor a heavy fog was encountered which made a day's difference in a run that is even now a fast one. The ships Harry Morse and St. Nicholas left Nushagak together, and with the reported weather may make a speedy appearance here. The first named vessel brings 37,000 cases of fish. Everything was going along smoothly in that section when the North Star sailed. Her entire trip from Astoria occupied four months and one week. Superintendent Borglund came down on the ship's books as "A. B."
